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


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Jou're in Fredericksburg visiting, but do you really know Fred?

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



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A Step Back in Time

Pioneer Museum features exhibits on early life

In the mid-1840s, Germans looking for a better life were reading and hearing about Texas as a land of limitless opportunity. They risked everything to get here, faced every obstacle and created a unique German colony in the heart of the Texas Hill Country.

The Pioneer Museum grounds is a combination museum and historical site on 3.5 acres featuring historic homesteads and buildings donated by founding families of Gillespie County.

Among the structures are a one-room school-house, a log cabin, a Sunday house, a bath house, a barn, a smokehouse that showcase artifacts and architecture which help to preserve and tell their story.

Visitors also may browse through the Fredericksburg Volunteer Fire Department Museum which displays pieces of early 20th century firefighting equipment.

Vereins Kirche Museum

Just two blocks away from the main grounds stands the Vereins Kirche ("Society Church"). The Vereins Kirche is located in the middle of the town square, called Marktplatz. This is a replica of the first public building constructed by the pioneers in Fredericksburg.

The original, built in 1847 served as a combination church, school, and community center for decades. A replica was built in 1935, the project that launched the Gillespie County Historical Society.

Historic County Jail

Today's Historic Jail was completed in December 1885. The Historic Jail is 25 feet wide, 35 feet deep, and 20 to 22 feet high with two stories. The jail is open on the first Saturday of each month from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Kids' programs

Little Pioneers programs bring Gillespie County history to life for children with hands-on, interactive activities like blacksmithing, quilting, weaving, animal husbandry, stitching, baking and candle making.

The museum also celebrates the holidays with Kinderfest at Christmas time, and an Easter Egg Hunt in the spring.

Youth attractions

There's something for kids every month during the school year and weekly during summer.

Guided Tours

Give your group of 15 or more an elevated Pioneer Museum experience. Guides will interpret the historical relevance of each historic structure, provide helpful information and a personal touch to enhance appreciation of the exhibits. Allow an hour and a half for a guided tour.





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Archives, Research

The Gillespie County Historical Society (GCHS) houses archives pertaining to the life and culture of German settlers in Gillespie County. GCHS encourages the public to take advantage of the information found in these unique resources. The collection includes almost 70,000 individual items.

The museum also provides services that include selling copies of historic images in the collection and providing research materials for various projects.

Museum Store

The Pioneer Museum store offers a unique and varied selection of historical books by authors from the Texas Hill Country and beyond. It also features a variety of local-made sauces, jams, candles and more, as well as Texas-themed home decor, aprons, hand towels, pillows, signs, toys and logo memorabilia.

Living History Days

The Pioneer Museum hosts Living History days monthly and as program events throughout the vear.

First Saturday Living History Days — Held from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. on the first Saturday of every month, living history presenters from the Frontier History Company Foundation will be on site at both the Pioneer Museum and the Historic Jail.

A Pioneer Museum Day Pass provides visitors access to both these locations and the living history presentation.

Handwerkers are also on the Pioneer Museum grounds on these first Saturdays from 10 a.m.-12 noon, working on different types of handwork projects like needlepoint, bobbin lace, embroidery, cross stitch, knitting and crochet.

Pioneer Museum's premier Living History Days are Founders Day (early May) and Spring Break week (mid-March).

These museum programs showcase the living history presenters from the Frontier History Company Foundation, as well as blacksmiths, rope makers, chuckwagon cooks, spinners, handwerkers, corn shellers and more.

Plan your visit

Day passes are exclusively sold at Pioneer Museum and the Vereins Kirche Museum and are good for 24 hours from the time of purchase and provide entrance to Pioneer Museum, the Vereins Kirche Museum and Historic Jail (when open for programs).

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Historic Home Tour & Holiday Market

he Gillespie County Historical Society/ Pioneer Museum will host its 64th annual Home Tour on Saturday, Nov. 18 from 11 a.m.-5 p.m.

Themed "A Walk Through Time," this year's tour invites guests to explore the evolution of architecture in Fredericksburg. The tour is self-guided with docents available in each home to explain its unique features.

The seven homes on the tour record the history of Hill Country homebuilding, beginning with the "rock houses" built by the frugal pioneers who settled this area and built their homes using the abundant limestone they quarried here.

From there, an increase in available building materials led to grander homes built in the Victorian style toward the end of the 19th century.

The early 20th century saw the emergence of Arts and Crafts style bungalows as young people returned to Fredericksburg after seeing and studying architecture in bigger cities. Later, the 20th century also brought even more modern design features to Fredericksburg, and the area saw a surge in mid-century modern elements.

Holiday Market

As with previous Home Tours, this year's tour is coupled with the annual Holiday Market. The Holiday Market will be held from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. in the Historic Sanctuary and Social Hall at 312 W. San Antonio St. and will feature 20 high-end, artisanal Hill Country vendors.

Home Tour tickets cost \$40 and include admission to the Holiday Market and the Pioneer Museum. Tickets to attend only the Holiday Market are \$12 and include admission to the Pioneer Museum, as well.

Preview Party

For those wanting to be the first to shop the Market, a Holiday Market Preview Party will be held from 6-8 p.m. Friday, Nov. 17. Tickets for this special event are limited and cost \$45. This Preview Party includes appetizers, champagne and entertainment.

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A Landmark and Symbol

The Vereins Kirche is a unique landmark in the center of downtown Fredericksburg. The octagonal building is owned and managed by the Gillespie County Historical Society (GCHS).

After an extensive renovation in 2019 and re-installation of exhibits, the Vereins Kirche features the history of the building in a permanent exhibit that begins with the German immigrants' trip to Texas in the 1840s through the present.

In January 1934, the GCHS was formed with one major goal in mind, to rebuild the Vereins Kirche. Since then, the GCHS has continued to preserve the history and culture of Fredericksburg and Gillespie County through exhibits and educational programs and outreach.

History

The original Vereins Kirche served as the town's first church, school and public meeting place, in addition to a lookout building for protection against invaders.

The replica of the Vereins Kirche has been used as a library, home to the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce, a one-day post office and a museum.

The original Vereins Kirche, or Society Church, was used primarily as a church and school for Catholic and Evangelical Protestants. School districts were created in Gillespie County in the 1850s and students were no longer using the Vereins Kirche. As with the school, church congregations began building their own churches in town and slowly leaving the Vereins Kirche empty most days.

By the town's 50th anniversary in 1896, the stone walls were removed to make the Vereins Kirche a pavilion for the celebration. The building was torn down in 1897 after it fell into disrepair.

For many years, local citizens had the vision of building a replica of the Vereins Kirche.

In 1935, the Gillespie County Historical Society received its charter and began working to rebuild the Vereins Kirche as a pioneer memorial. Fundraising by citizens and help from the New Deal Public Works Administration supported the building of the Vereins Kirche. A celebration was held in May 1935 and the Vereins Kirche Pioneer Memorial was officially opened.

The first use of the new Vereins Kirche was to house Pioneer Memorial Library and a small historical museum. The first exhibits included memorabilia



and collectibles from the early pioneer days.

When the Gillespie County Historical Society purchased the Kammlah Homestead in 1955, most of its artifacts were moved and displayed in the Kammlah House while a small exhibit space remained in the Vereins Kirche.

In 1967, after the second courthouse had been refurbished by Eugene and Margaret McDermott of Dallas, Pioneer Memorial Library left the Vereins Kirche and took up residence in the McDermott Building where it remains today.

For a few years, part of the Vereins Kirche was home to the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce, with GCHS exhibit space occupying some of the building. It was during this time that the GCHS began archiving and organizing its collection.

When the Chamber moved out of the Vereins Kirche, the space became an area for the GCHS Archives and Collections (now located at the GCHS offices in the historic First Methodist Church at 312 West San Antonio Street).

Hours of Operation

• The Vereins Kirche is open six days a week, year-round, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., closed on Sundays.

• There is an admission fee of \$5 which can be purchased at the Vereins Kirche or at Pioneer Museum, 325 West Main Street.

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
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ioneer Memorial Library offers a quiet haven for readers away from the bustle of Main

Located next to the Gillespie County Courthouse at 115 West Main Street, the library welcomes guests of all ages to read and explore thousands of books.

Services

Library cards can be issued free of charge to residents of Gillespie County. Proof of residency - such as a driver's license - is required upon application.

Children, ages six and over, can be issued a card, with a parent or legal guardian's signature.

Residents of the immediately surrounding counties (Kimble, Mason, Llano, Blanco, Kendall and Kerr) are also eligible to use the library's resources for a \$5 fee.

Books may be checked out for two weeks, and if not requested by another library user, may be renewed for another two weeks.

Youth

Young readers can find their own exclusive area on the first floor. Picture books, stories for children and fiction and non-fiction reads for older kids are featured.

A schedule for events — such as story time can be found at the library's central desk.

Adults

Adult fiction and non-fiction books, reference materials, the Texas collection, magazines and periodicals are located on the second floor, accessible by stairs or elevator.

Library 'Friends'

In addition to being a department of the County of Gillespie, Pioneer Memorial Library is supported by the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library.

Annual membership in the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library is open to all at a nominal cost.

Library history

Pioneer Memorial Library is housed in a former Gillespie County Courthouse, which was designed by Alfred Giles.

The historic building served as the courthouse from 1882 until 1939 when the courthouse transitioned into a newly erected building next door.

Various governmental organizations occupied the building until it was closed in 1963.

Two years later, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Mc-Dermott of Dallas funded the preservation of the building so that it could be used as a public library. It was dedicated in May 1967.

In 1983, Mrs. McDermott provided a challenge for a matching grant so that renovations and expansion to the second floor could be accomplished. The community responded, and the renovated library was dedicated in December of 1984.

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
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Music Club Brings World Class Musicians to Town

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German Choirs Year-Round

eeping German tradition and heritage alive are two local choirs — the Arion Men's Choir and the Hermann Sons Mixed Choir.

Membership is voluntary and adults who enjoy singing are invited to join in and participate at any time.

Arion Männerchor (Arion Men's Choir), founded in 1908, and the Hermannsöhne Gemischter Chor (Hermann Sons Mixed Choir), active since 1934, are both directed by Amy Voorhees and accompanied by Annabel Wilkinson.

Both choirs have weekly rehearsals and performances throughout the year. Rehearsals are held at St. Joseph's Halle every Thursday evening.

New members are always welcome and knowledge of the German language is helpful, but not required, nor is the ability to sight-read music.

The choirs' repertoire ranges from sacred music to classical masterworks to folk songs.

They jointly present a free-admission public concert in the spring, usually the first Sunday in May (Maifest), and another in the fall, the first Sunday in November, a Herbstfest (Harvestfest).

Both of these events are usually held at St. Joseph's Halle or the St. Mary's Holy Family Center.

In addition, they represent Fredericksburg in a yearly Saengerfest (singers' festival) along with German choirs from San Antonio, New Braunfels and Corpus Christi.

Both choirs also appear regularly at Oktoberfest, and give performances from time to time during the year at nursing and retirement homes.

At this time, concerts are being scheduled for the coming months. Information will be published in the coming issues of the Fredericksburg Standard-Radio Post.

uring the 19th and early 20th centuries, students learned the three R's: reading, writing and arithmetic in the comfort of a one-room school house, many of which were located out in the country.


Later came schools like Fredericksburg Independent School District, Harper ISD and Doss Common Consolidated School District, and the rural schools took their place in history.

Those schools are now things of the past, but the sites and even memories can still be revisited, courtesy of a visit on the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail.

'Schools Trail'

The "schools trail" gives visitors and residents alike a chance to venture into the earlier days of Texas, when German settlers came to the Texas





Hill Country and established country schools to educate their children.

Among the old school houses on the driving trail are Cave Creek, Cherry Mountain, Cherry Spring, Crabapple, Grapetown, Junction, Lower South Grape Creek, Luckenbach, Meusebach Creek, Nebgen, Pecan Creek, Rheingold, Williams Creek (Albert), White Oak, Willow City and Wrede.

Due to the Gilmer-Aiken Laws, in the 1950s and 1960s, the schools were consolidated into the Fredericksburg Independent School District.

On Jan. 23, 2006, the Gillespie County Commissioners Court established the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail. This trail linked the 16 historic former rural schools with the Vereins Kirche, which is a replica of the first school in the county.

'Friends'

The Friends of Gillespie County Country Schools, in conjunction with several organizations, sponsors the trail and various activities throughout the year so that people can learn more about the county's educational history.

The Friends consists of former students of the closed schools and area community residents.

Their mission statement is to preserve the past to enrich the future: to further the preservation and maintenance of historic community school buildings and improvements in Gillespie County; to support the activities of Gillespie County with respect to the preservation and maintenance of historic community school buildings and improvements in the County through assistance with fundraising and other means; to use and allow others to use such buildings and improvements for public purposes, by making such buildings and improvements available as community centers for public purposes.

The properties are listed in the Register of National Historic Places and are on the Country School Association of America National Schoolhouse Registry.

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Museum Honors Sacrifice and Service of WWII Pacific Vets

he National Museum of the Pacific War interweaves the stories of America, China, Japan, Korea and others, telling the story of how World War II was won in the Pacific.

The museum honors the more than 100,000 Americans who gave their lives in the war in the Pacific and eight million who served in World War II, by "truthfully and respectfully telling the story of their struggles, their sacrifices and their triumphs."

Formerly known as the Nimitz Museum — in honor of Fredericksburg's Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz — the National Museum of the Pacific War is located at 340 East Main Street.

An eight-foot bronze statue of the admiral stands in Nimitz Platz, at the entrance of the museum.

The museum preserves the stories of all who served and those who did not return home. It teaches the history of the Asiatic-Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II through educational platforms, connecting to current and future national security issues. The museum facilitates programs to memorialize and support all veterans.

A 33,000-square-foot exhibition area features 40 media installations, approximately 900 artifacts in 97 climate-controlled cases, 15 macroartifacts and hundreds of photographs.

The museum occupies six acres and has become one of the elite military museums in the nation.

The attractions include the Admiral Nimitz Museum, George H.W. Bush Gallery, the Japanese Garden of Peace, the Memorial Courtyard, the Plaza of Presidents, the Nimitz Education and Research Center and the Pacific Combat Zone. The Admiral Nimitz Museum houses exhibits in the Cailloux Education Center and the Admiral Nimitz Grand Ballroom and Mezzanine on his life and career as he fought in World War II.

Exhibits in the George H.W. Bush Gallery convey the shock and destruction of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Within the gallery is an HA-19, one of the five Japanese two-man submarines that took part in the attack.

In the Memorial Courtyard, the museum honors the individuals, ships and units that fought in the Pacific Theater.

The archives of the National Museum of the Pacific War holds thousands of manuscripts, official documents, photographs and recorded interviews with Pacific War veterans.

All the archives are housed in the Nimitz Education and Research Center, which is open to the public by appointment only.

The museum stages Living History Reenactments that put viewers on the front line at the Pacific Combat Zone, located two blocks east of the main museum.

The WWII Pacific Combat Program features 60-minute shows which immerse visitors in battle, dramatically showing the equipment, weapons and tactics of the U.S. Army and Marines and the Imperial Japanese Army.

Admission for the show is \$10 for adults; \$5 for students; and free for children five and under. Ear plugs are provided.

Advance tickets are available at the George H.W. Bush Gallery or the Admiral Nimitz Museum. Walk-up tickets are sometimes available at the combat zone prior to the program.

Pacific Combat Zone

The Pacific Combat Zone is a unique two-acre indoor/outdoor exhibit and one of the museum's most popular venues.

In March 2017, the museum finished its \$8 million renovation to the complex.

Live reenactments are staged eight times a year on the weekends and feature history and details on weapons used during the war, as well as current weaponry.

The finale features a look into a war-like scenario with the weapons being fired.

The big change to the new Pacific Combat Zone is that the exhibits are no longer only accessible by guided tour.

Guests can come and spend as long as they would like exploring the exhibits in Phase 1.

Upon entering the Pacific Combat Zone, guests can see a to-scale map of the Pacific Theater and take time to walk the map and get an understanding of just how large this theater of WWII was.

Entering the PT 309 boat exhibit allows guests onto the deck of a PT boat tender as it is being equipped for a mission.

This exhibit includes video displays covering a PT boat mission, an oral history kiosk, and the history of PT 309 "Oh Frankie," the boat on display.

The TBM exhibit takes museum-goers below

deck of an aircraft carrier where they will see up close a TBM Avenger getting ready for a mission.

Visitors can take time to test their skills on tabletop games stationed in front of the plane.

They can launch torpedoes at enemy ships, defend a ship from enemy attack by manning an anti-aircraft gun, and land the pilot safely on the deck by waiving him in on his approach.

This exhibit also includes video displays, information panels about flight missions, and artifacts.

General Information

The Pacific Combat Zone is open 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and The Nimitz Gallery and George H.W. Bush Gallery are open Wednesday through Monday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The museum is closed Tuesdays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas day.

Admission is free for WWII veterans.

Senior citizens 65 and older are \$16; adults are \$24; teachers and military members (active or retired) with an I.D. are \$14; children six and over, along with students who have ID, are \$10; children five and under are free.

ill Country travelers frequent the attractions Luckenbach has to offer, much like └ Willie, Waylon and the boys did in 1977. Known for its "Everybody's Somebody" attitude and live entertainment, Luckenbach Texas is a popular destination for music fans, bikers and all those interested in discovering the tiny town in the tune heard by millions.

With its store, dance hall and picnic tables underneath arching live oak trees, Luckenbach (a sign jokes "Population 3") is a destination in its own.

Open daily at 9 a.m., the family-friendly store offers visitors an old-fashioned experience and merchandise ranging from the nostalgic to items bearing the town's oval-shaped logo.

The town also hosts regional and national acts. During quieter times, one can find a picker's circle for those who want to swap tunes and musically mingle with the locals.

With nearly daily performances on the outside stage or in the dancehall, visitors can sit back and enjoy a beverage of choice while enjoying the musicians who provide tunes with a Texas flair.

History

Luckenbach began in 1852 when Jacob Luckenbach and his brothers, William and August, moved to the area from Fredericksburg and began

William Luckenbach opened a post office under the name of South Grape Creek in 1854 which operated for 11 years.

In 1886, August Engel Jr. reopened a post office for the community along with a general store in the Engel homestead. It was named Luckenbach by Minna Engel, who recently married Carl Albert Luckenbach.

Engel and his descendants later moved the post office and general store down the street and added a blacksmith shop, dance hall and cotton gin.

In the 1970s, the Engel family sold the town to Hondo Crouch, Kathy Morgan and Guich Koock.

During the years that followed, Luckenbach gained national attention as a "metropolis of mirth," thanks in large part to Crouch's far-reaching humor and charismatic personality.

Jerry Jeff Walker later enhanced the town's reputation by recording his live album, "Viva Terlingua," there 50 years ago.

From 1995 through 1999, Willie Nelson held his storied Fourth of July Picnic at Luckenbach.

Today, one can find local and traveling musicians on stage or at the Picker's Circle, a weekend dance in the hall or one of the many events on the


FTC has been recognized as recognition as the Theater of the Decade (2010-2020) in the San Antonio region by BroadwayWorld.com Awards.

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Relive the Texas Frontier **Days at Fort Martin Scott**

■ake a trip to Fort Matin Scott to see where the lives of Apache and Comanche tribes, Anglo settlers, U.S. Army soldiers and frontiersmen known as the Texas Rangers came together centuries ago.

Fort Martin Scott, on the old Pinta Trail, is operated by the Texas Rangers Heritage Center, located adjacent to the fort site.

In 1823, a group of frontiersmen formed to protect settlers on the Texas frontier and became known as the Texas Rangers. German settlers established Fredericksburg in 1846, and subsequently formed a cooperative society with the Comanches and the Rangers. The settlers and tribes signed a peace treaty in 1847, allowing for trade of food and supplies.

In 1848, U.S. Army units arrived and established Camp Houston on the Barons Creek site, the first of many frontier forts to protect pioneers moving west. The camp was renamed Fort Martin Scott in December 1849 after Lt. Col. Martin Scott, who died in the Mexican-American War.

In 1850, Indian Agent John Rollins, Army, and Rangers representatives and interpreters met with a group of chiefs on the banks of the San Saba River and forged the Fort Martin Scott Treaty of 1850. Today, the Treaty Stone recognizing the pact is displayed in the fort visitor center.

The Army moved west as the frontier expanded westward. Fort Martin Scott was abandoned in

1866, but its story was not over.

In 1870, John Braeutigam and his family bought acreage that included the fort, and they lived in the guardhouse for 90 years. He ran Braeutigam Gardens, which included a saloon, store, race track and the area's first dance hall, and which hosted the first four Gillespie County fairs, until his death in 1884.

The City of Fredericksburg bought the land in 1949, and the Fredericksburg Heritage Federation started restoration of the fort that continues today.

Today, the fort includes a visitor center/barracks, restored officer's quarters, the guardhouse (the only original building), a blacksmith shop and stone foundations of many of the buildings.

The fort comes alive with re-enactments, storytelling, education days for schools and special events.


Fort Martin Scott is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. Self-guided tours can be taken other days of the week from dusk until dawn.

Fort Martin Scott is located on U.S. Highway 290 East, across from the Gillespie County Law **Enforcement Center.**

Texas Rangers Campus Celebrates Law Enforcement

Redericksburg is home to the Texas Rangers Heritage Center, the 12-acre campus of the Former Texas Rangers Association, which marked its 200th anniversary earlier this year in March.

The 26,000-square-foot center houses a 350-seat open-air pavilion featuring an amphitheater with a fire pit. It offers a full catering kitchen and a Lone Star Stories Campfire Ring that support a wide range of event opportunities.

The site also includes a campanile (bell tower) and a Ring of Honor, which is a 30-foot simulation of a Ranger badge memorializing Rangers who lost their lives in the line of duty.

The center is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Closed Sunday and Monday.

Contact the Texas Rangers Heritage Center office at 830-990-1192.

Fundraising efforts are underway for Phase II of the center, which will feature a museum.

Museum planners want to incorporate galleries

and immersive experiences, which will include interactive exhibits and a theater that will include stories of Rangers battling bootlegging, counterfeiting, murders, and the man who stopped the University of Texas Tower shooter in 1966.

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t's more than just a rock. The Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, known for the expansive views from atop its 1,825-feet high pink granite dome, offers hikers, campers and outdoor enthusiasts expansive views above and below sea level.

The scenery, rock formations, hiking trails and night skies keep the hundreds of thousands of hikers, campers and outdoor enthusiasts coming back each year.

The park is located at 16710 Ranch Road 965, 18 miles north of Fredericksburg. Information is available at 830-685-3636 or by visiting tpwd. texas.gov/state-parks/enchanted-rock.

Things to do at the park are: Hiking, backpacking, camping, rock climbing, picnicking, birding, nature studying, geocaching and stargazing. There is no swimming or bike riding on the trails allowed.

Hiking/Backpacking

There are close to 11 miles of hiking trails across the 640-acre park for backpacking. Trails close 30 minutes after sunset, except the Loop Trail. The Summit Trail may close in wet weather. View the Interactive Trails Map here: tpwd.texas. gov/state-parks/enchanted-rock/trails-info

Camping

There are primitive, group and walk-in campsites available to park guests for a fee. To check the fee schedule visit: tpwd.texas.gov/state-parks/ enchanted-rock/fees-facilities/campsites

Rock Climbing

Birders can request a checklist at park headquarters to find the various and abundant fowl in the area. Geocaching

Hunting for hidden treasure is a good way to explore the park. Star Gazing

People can marvel at the vastness of the universe under the skies of the Enchanted Rock SNA, which has been designed an International Dark Sky Park. Visit all the skies have to offer here: tpwd.texas.gov/state-parks/enchanted-rock/more-info/dark-skies

Enchanted Rock rises 425 feet above the base elevation of the park. Its high point is 1,825 feet above sea level, and the entire dome covers 640 acres. Climbing the Rock is like climbing the stairs of a 30- or 40-story building.

In addition to the variety of trails to choose from, people can choose the difficulty level of walk.













Hike to the Highest Heights

isitors to Fredericksburg looking for a unique hiking trail can head to Cross Mountain Park on the north side of town.

The park is home to Cross Mountain, which is located on a marl and limestone hill with an elevation of 1,951 feet.

Cross Mountain has been a fixture since 1847 when settlers discovered a timber cross at the top of the hill.

Early Fredericksburg pioneers gave it the name "Kreuzberg" or Cross Mountain.

In 1946, a permanent lighted cross was erected. The history of Cross Mountain reaches far back.

When the early settlers arrived here in 1846, they found the remnants of a wooden cross that had been erected there most probably by the Spanish missionaries who had by then established missions in San Antonio, San Saba and other areas of Texas.

For the Indians, too, it was a landmark as it lay on the Pinta Trail, one of the oldest Indian trails in the state. From the Pinta Trail crossing on the Pedernales River, the trail divided, with this branch following the Upper Crabapple Road in the direction of Bear Mountain and then on to Enchanted Rock and beyond.

Cross Mountain gained its name when an early-day German settler, John Christian Durst, found the old cross of heavy timbers at its summit that was presumably erected by the Spanish missionaries. He named it "Kreuzberg" (Cross Mountain), a name that has never changed.



In the summer of 1848, Father George Menzel, a Bohemian priest, erected a more substantial cross as a symbol of redemption and civilization.

During the Diamond Jubilee of St. Mary's Catholic Church in 1921, a more permanent cross was placed on top of the hill. It was constructed of concrete, reinforced steel and sheet metal.

When rural electrification came to the area in 1946, the cross was illuminated. It burns bright each evening from dark to dawn.

The park was purchased by Dr. J. Hardin Perry in the 1900s to keep it from being developed. It then ended up in the ownership of the Gillespie County Historical Society.

In 1999, the City of Fredericksburg obtained ownership of the historic landmark.

The park is now maintained by the City of Fredericksburg Parks and Recreation Department.


An official Texas Historical Commission marker was dedicated in observance of Founders Day on May 7, 1977, and the Nature Trail was dedicated during the 1978 Founders Day activities at the site.

The park recently added a new trail and three picnic areas, and offers several trails, an overlook and restrooms.

The park is open from dawn to dusk and there is no fee to enter.

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






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he Lyndon B. Johnson State Park and Historic Site at Stonewall is an outdoor walk through history.

It's where historians, naturalists, recreationalists, wildlife viewers, political enthusiasts, wild-flower lovers, walkers, anglers and others can find something of interest.

The park features historical exhibits, memorabilia and a living history farm with recreational sports, nature trails and bicycling opportunities and shopping.

Reservations are suggested for day visits and camping by going to texasstateparks.reserveamerica.com. For updated information, visit tpwd. texas.gov/state-parks/lyndon-b-johnson.

Honoring a President

The LBJ State Park and Historic Site honors Gillespie County native Lyndon B. Johnson, the 36th President of the United States.

A Visitor Center complex houses exhibits and memorabilia focusing on the late president's two terms of office.

Park Facilities

The Visitor Center is the first stop for any tour to the LBJ Ranch, which is a part of the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park.

Attached to the Visitor Center is the Behrens Cabin, a two-room dogtrot cabin built during the 1840s by German immigrant Johannes Behrens.

There's also an outdoor amphitheater used for a variety of programs.

Numerous shaded picnic and rest areas (some with restroom facilities) are available at the state park. From early June through the summer, a large pool facility — complete with a children's wading pool and a covered pavilion — is manned by certified lifeguards. Nearby are two lighted tennis courts.

The park's dining hall and group picnic area are available by reservation, and are located on the banks of the Pedernales River, as well as a separate baseball diamond facility.

Fishing is allowed without a license from the banks of state park lands. However, those who go into the waterways on a boat, for example, must have a fishing license.

Nature Trails

Elsewhere in the park, a winding nature trail leads walkers to a larger-than-life bronze statue of the former president overlooking the Pedernales River.

The trail also winds near a wildlife enclosure housing American bison and other areas with members of the Official State of Texas Longhorn Herd.

Another trail approximately a mile long is handicapped accessible and suitable for wheel-chairs and strollers. It departs the Visitor Center and travels through fields of wildflowers and past the Texas Longhorns' pen to the Danz cabins.

Every trail in the park is marked with directional signs and strategically placed markers giving brief highlights of the path. Leashed pets are welcomed but are not allowed inside buildings.

ady Bird Johnson once said she had a passion for showing "her country," to those not from Texas. "Her country," being Hill Country.

Just three miles from downtown attractions, is the 150-acre Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park, the crown jewel of the City of Fredericksburg's parks system. It's a getaway for locals and visitors, alike.

"My special cause, the one that alerts my interest and quickens the pace of my life," Johnson once said, "is to preserve the wildflowers and native plants that define the regions of our land - to encourage and promote their use in appropriate areas and thus help pass on to generations in waiting the quiet joys and satisfactions I have known since my childhood."

There is no admission charge to the park located southwest of town on Texas 16 South.

Day Use Activities

Daytime visitors to Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park can use picnic tables (available on a first-come first-served basis), four playgrounds, tennis and pickle ball courts at no charge to accommodate those looking for outdoor activities in the scenic Hill Country.

Three nature trails, established by the Friends of the Fredericksburg Nature Center, lead hikers across Live Oak Creek.

The park offers a 17-acre lake and plenty of spots to wet a line. Motor boats, however, are prohibited, as are trotlines.

Elsewhere in the park, there are baseball and softball fields, a sand volleyball court, an outdoor basketball court and a seasonal swimming pool (with a kiddie pool to the side).

Rental facilities

Visitors who plan large gatherings may want to look into using one of the park's five large outdoor covered pavilions or one of three indoor





sites, including the Tatsch House, the Cardinal Room at the golf course clubhouse or the spacious Pioneer Pavilion.

Each of the five outdoor pavilions is available on a first-come first-served basis or by reservation.

Information about the facilities and reservation opportunities is available from the City of Fredericksburg's website, fbgtx.org.

Camping

Camping under the stars is available at the park, which accommodates RVs and tents.

In all, there are 90 RV spaces available for travel trailers with 30-50 amp electrical hookups, water and sewer, cable, Internet and shade trees.

Check rates for short- and long-term RV and tent camping at fbgtx.org. All campers must check in at the park office to receive a camping permit before 10 p.m. on weekends and 5 p.m. on weekdays.

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Flora and Fauna on View at the Nature Center

he Fredericksburg Nature Center is located at Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park and is an attraction that features wildlife and their habitat homes along with several nature trails for enthusiasts to enjoy.

The initial stage of nature trails was built between 2000 and 2002 after Bill Lindemann and friends formed the Friends of the Fredericksburg Nature Center non-profit organization.

The Live Oak Wilderness Trail began construction in 2000 and was the first trail to be completed.

The trail was approximately 3,000 feet long and included several ecosystems, including forest, prairie, riparian, wetlands and post oak savannah.

A major diversity of wildlife exists within the relatively small area of the trail system, including 240 wildflowers, 180 birds, 70 butterflies, 50 odonates (dragonfly family), and various mammals, reptiles, fish, trees and grasses.

The Vista Loop trail was completed in 2002 and added 200 feet to the trail system at the Fredericksburg Nature Center.

Five years later, in 2007, 650 feet of the Vista Loop Trail was converted to a handicapped accessibility trail located next to an adjacent parking lot.

This portion of the center offers beautiful vistas, access to the butterfly habitat, bird feeding area, a wildflower pocket prairie, and a rock and geology exhibition site.

Park visitors can also check out the Pollinator Garden which is considered to be the most beautiful area of the park and a "must see" destination.

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
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Wildseed Farms originated in Eagle Lake, Texas in 1982.

Wildseed Farms was founded by John and Marilyn Thomas after they spent seven years in Eagle Lake working on a family rice and cattle farm.

John Thomas' knowledge of farming led him to plant wildflowers initially on his property in Eagle Lake as a fun project.

In 1982, curious passersby noticed his beautiful wildflowers growing on his property. His farm attracted people from near and far, clogging the small roadways in Eagle Lake.

In 1993, Wildseed Farms was created in Fredericksburg on 217 acres with the intention to make beautiful wildflowers more accessible at a cheaper rate for businesses and the residents of Fredericksburg.

Visitors to the farm and market center will see fields of wildflowers blooming from March through October. The farm also offers a boutique, a Lantana Nursery and a Biergarten, with a little bit of everything for the whole family.

Visitors to the farm can explore the walking trails and take photos while sipping on a glass of cold wine or any other refreshment.

The farm also began growing grapes in 2015 to help with the growing Texas Hill Country grape business. The farm now boasts a tasting room, featuring a variety of Hill Country wines.



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isitors to Old Tunnel State Park, located 11 miles south of Fredericksburg on the Old San Antonio Road, can get one of nature's best shows around between May and October.

Those who arrive early enough can get a seat close to the action where hundreds of thousands of bats leave an old railroad tunnel to spread out over the region and feast on insects and moths. Only 70 seats are available for the presentation and seating is on a first-come, first-served basis.

Cost for that program, as well as admission to the lower trail and lower viewing seats, is \$5 per person. Park guides conduct an educational program in the lower observation area closer to the tunnel about 30 minutes to an hour prior to the estimated bat emergence times on Thursday through Sunday evenings.

Others may watch the nightly emergence from observation decks located just above the opening of the tunnel. In addition, the upper viewing deck contains glass-plated biological displays aimed at educating the public on the life cycle of the bats and their importance to the ecological system.

Beginning in late March or early April, up to three million-plus bats make their home inside the 920-foot landmark railroad tunnel at the 16.1acre Old Tunnel State Park.

Mexican Free-tailed Bats, as well as an estimated 3,000 cave myotis bats, funnel out of a now-defunct railroad tunnel between May and October. The largest bat populations and corresponding longer emergence times (up to 45 minutes) fall later in the summer.

Originally built in 1913, the tunnel was used by the Fredericksburg and Northern Railroad until its abandonment in 1941.

Attendees also can enjoy hiking, bird-watching and general wildlife viewing on the half-mile nature trail. The trail opens daily at sunrise and closes at 5 p.m. The trail is primitive and can be

To minimize disturbance to the bat colony and for safety, visitors are asked to stay on the designated trail and not approach the tunnel.

Visitors are also advised to bring drinking water, as no water is available in the park. Picnic tables are available. Restrooms are only open in the evenings during bat season (May to October).

Due to the sensitive nature of the park, no camping, pets or smoking is allowed. Picnic tables are available at the park, along with a half-mile birdwatching trail.



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County Youth in 4-H and **FFA Compete Statewide**

or Gillespie County 4-Hers and Fredericksburg and Harper FFA members, a trip into the spotlight with their livestock or ag mechanics projects is serious business.

For the hundreds of Gillespie County youth who compete, the livestock shows are the culmination of months of long hours of caring for, feeding and grooming their animals.

And these livestock exhibitors often see their hard work pay off in the form of championship honors, prize ribbons, trophies, rewarding bids paid at the auctions and scholarships.

For months prior to the stock show season, Gillespie County 4-Hers and Fredericksburg and Harper FFA members are busy working with their animals.

They are assisted by advisors, teachers and adult volunteers as they ready for local shows and competitions around the state.

While several livestock shows are held in the fall, competitions don't begin until January for most youngsters.

Officially kicking off the 2024 stock show season for all of the county's youth is the Gillespie County Youth Livestock Show. This coming year's show will be Jan. 3-6, 2024, at the Show Barn at the Gillespie County Fair Grounds.

Hundreds of entries are annually displayed at the county show, including market steers, hogs, meat goats and lambs, along with breeding beef cattle, breeding sheep, goats, broilers and turkeys.

At the auction that concludes the county show, local merchants, business people and individuals from the surrounding area turn out to support young exhibitors with their bids.

In August, local youths join exhibitors from around the state in competing for top honors in livestock competitions held as part of the Gillespie County Fair.



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
katers and bikers have a safe place to ply their trade in Fredericksburg. Until 2015, riders of all ages were practicing tricks in the gym and drain ditches at Hill Country Evangelical Free Church, where associate pastor and youth minister Kelly Graham opened doors to a crowd with nowhere to go.

In 2015, the Fredericksburg Morning Rotary Club built the park for \$325,000, decked out with bowls and rails.

Portland, Oregon-based Evergreen Skate Parks, run by longtime boarders Bill and Catherine Coulson, designed the 24,000-square-foot park.

The City of Fredericksburg maintains the park, which can be entered at Old Fair Park near H-E-B.





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
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Landing Residents, Visitors, and Business

illespie County Airport serves as a gateway to the Texas Hill Country for jet setters, aviation hobbyists and visitors alike.

Corporate jets, single engine aircraft and pilots of a variety of other types of aircraft are all accommodated at the facility, located at 191 Airport Road, just south of downtown Fredericksburg on Texas Highway 16. (The facility sits between the Gillespie County Fair Grounds and Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park.)

Classed as a general aviation airport, it features a 5,000-foot runway and full-length parallel taxiway and has runway lights and a beacon that operate from sunset to sunrise, giving the airport a 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week, operational capability. During daylight hours of limited visibility, the lights can be turned on by the approaching pilot.

Instrument approaches are available to both ends of the runway, and precision approach path indicators provide pilots with visual assistance during night landing operations.

A fully-automated weather system (AWOS) informs pilots about local conditions.

Operated under Gillespie County government, the facility has seen constant upgrades and expansions as it services more and more pilots.

The airport's terminal building provides a comfortable environment for pilots, crews and passengers waiting on aircraft.

An additional convenience is available with the credit card-operated refueling system that provides aviation gasoline (100LL) and jet fuel 24 hours a day.

Airport manager Tony Lombardi can provide information on all airport operations. The airport has 89 tie-down positions for public use. Longterm T-hangar spaces are available through three different entities.

The adjacent Hangar Hotel and Conference Center boasts 50 upscale guest rooms, an officer's club, meeting facilities for large groups and a classic 1940s-style diner, unique facilities for a non-metropolitan airport.

Businesses at the airport include the Pippen-York Flying Machine Company, which

provides avionics installation and repair, and Tac-Aero, which provides major and minor airframe and engine repair, aircraft rental, rides and flight school. The Crosswind Aviation school also offers rides on Saturdays and weekdays by appointment.

The Gillespie County Airport also features the Fredericksburg FBO, a full-service fixed-based operator that provides fuel service, information and service to pilots and crews. It houses more than 20,000 square feet of storage and is currently constructing additional hangars.

Ground transportation options include rental cars from The Motor Pool at Fredericksburg FBO.

Owner, Taylor Hill, whose maiden name is Bible, founded the wedding business almost by accident.

Hill is a Hill Country native who grew up in Johnson City where her parents own a restaurant. She left for college with no plans to be a wedding profession-

"I went to Blinn College for two years, and I was trying to figure out what I wanted to do," said Hill. "I was going to school for business (but) could never find what I wanted to do.

"I found this wedding planning course randomly in Dallas."

Hill then took an internship with a wedding planner in Waco and worked there for six months.

"Right after that, I started my own business," said Hill.

Coming Home

Hill launched her business in Waco prior to making her way to Fredericksburg.

"It was a really booming little business," said Hill. "Waco was starting to grow there with Magnolia (Market).

"But I quickly realized to make the most money or find the clients that best fit, (the business) just wasn't in Waco. The budgets weren't there for me to sustain a business full time."

Hill began to feel the attraction to the Hill Country where she was raised.

"I missed my family," said Hill. "I missed the Hill Country. I came home and started my business here."

That move paid off for Hill, who moved back at a time when Fredericksburg and its surroundings were seeing massive growth of wedding venues.

"Fredericksburg was starting to really get going with venues," said Hill. "New venues were popping up all over the place."

Joining the Network

Traveling around and meeting the venue owners

was the major marketing strategy for Hill, who claimed that her business had significant growth right from the beginning.

"It was all about network," said Hill. "It was literally just making connections with all the awesome venue owners around here. I don't think my business would have worked without making those connections."

Within weeks, Hill had weddings booked on her calendar months ahead, filling up her yearly calendar. As the dates continued to fill, Hill began to realize she might need some help if TBW Creative Studios was going to continue to grow.

During a summer, Hill took in a young woman to live with her in her home who wound up taking work as an intern for Hill throughout the summer. Once Hill had the ability to split responsibilities, she recognized the best way forward.

I quickly realized I needed to add another coordinator (and) this is the way to go to keep growing business," said Hill. "The easiest way is to take multiple (weddings) and have multiple coordinators."

Hill has continued to grow her coordinator staff and is now capable of working three weddings each weekend.

Adding Florals

While interning with her mentor in Waco, Hill learned how to do florals, a service that business provided.

Despite initially disliking floral work, Hill learned the skill and eventually decided to provide the service to some of her smaller Fredericksburg weddings just to make the planning process simple, since there were few florists in the area. It didn't take long for the wedding floral business to grow as fast as her wedding planning service had done.

"They found it as a one stop shop situation where we could design the wedding and then also come in



(with) the florals," said Hill.

Hill's floral business has motivated her most dramatic growth, igniting her need for a delivery van and eventually a store front shop.

Many residents of Fredericksburg have seen TBW Creative Studios' van around town, vibrantly decorated with bright flowers on almost every inch of the van's surface.

"I realized my SUV just wasn't going to cut it anymore," said Hill. "So, I was like, alright, I'm going to buy a van and put flowers all over it and make people see it, so I (can) use it for marketing."

As demand for a florist continued to thrive, Hill decided to open a shop that would provide a much-needed service to the area.

Hill moved TBW Creative Studio into a newly constructed building located at 1328 Texas 16 South, where her brightly colored van can usually be seen parked out front.

Inside the shop, Hill has the space to keep her flower inventory, prepare her wedding florals and have some office space for her planning services. But Hill is primarily hoping to expand her business as a floral service for locals with smaller daily needs.

"People have been loving it," said Hill. "We've been getting lots of local reoccurring flowers each week. We go to Caliche (Coffee) and we go to Hill Country Chocolates. So, we're getting a lot of those great little local (businesses)."

Hill emphasized her desire to grow her everyday floral services for more events such as anniversaries and funerals. For that purpose, she loves her store and its location.

"This location is great," said Hill. "It's not on Main Street, which we were never trying to market for the tourists. We just wanted the local business, so this location is great for that."

Already a successful wedding planner serving 50-60 weddings per year, Hill said that 98% of her wedding clients also use her floral services for their

Hill credits her growth to the fact that the Fredericksburg area has a significant wedding need, and not very many businesses to fill it, claiming that many wedding services are ordered out of the surrounding cities of Austin and San Antonio.

The few wedding services that exist in the area have a good relationship with each other, said Hill, helping her to feel connected to the community.

"I had no anticipation of it getting as much traction as it did so quick," said Hill.

"I love doing business here because it's just a small tight-knit community."

The Texas Hill Country has its share of beautiful properties, places that offer views of sunsets and vast rolling fields. Camp Hideaway is a wedding and event venue in Gillespie County that gives its guests a truly Texas view.

Owner, Judson Sutherland, and his wife, Wendy, looked at other properties in the area along the rural roads near Luckenbach Texas, while determining a place to start a wedding venue.

But when they drove up the driveway of what is now Camp Hideaway, they both got chills.

"We came onto the property and were literally driving up the drive and looking at each other like, oh my goodness, this is incredible," said Sutherland.

Sutherland and his wife were motivated to purchase the property during the COVID-19 shutdowns.

Sutherland said, "We realized this is actually a really awesome idea, because people now more than ever appreciate the value of getting away and being out in God's creation."

With a property set to view the best of the Texas sunsets, Sutherland set out to hire a staff that matched his vision for loving and serving people.

"Everyone sitting here is an A-player, everyone sincerely cares about helping people," said Sutherland.
"Everyone cares about working hard and cares about

helping each other."

Ollie Bushula, operations manager for the venue, worked at resorts all over the world before meeting Sutherland in Drippings Springs where the two instantly became friends. Facilities manager, Jeremy Jensen, spent much of his life in Colorado as an electrician and material mover. Kelsey Fisher, sales manager, developed a passion for weddings shortly after graduating from Texas State University in San Marcos

When Sutherland purchased the property from the previous owners, the location and amenities were already noteworthy. The hilltop location featured two homes, Ranch House and Sunrise House, capable of

sleeping 10 guests on the grounds between the two.

Many Gillespie County wedding venues do not provide any accommodation, so the two houses set Camp Hideaway apart. But soon, the venue plans to expand their overnight operation.

"We're going to start adding some luxury glamping tents, as well," said Bushula. "We will have that feel of a safari, but also elevated."

Luxury tents and yurts have gained popularity as B&Bs across the state, but there are few in Gillespie County. With the views at Camp Hideaway, luxury tents give the guests easy access to sunsets and night skies.

As a wedding venue, the increase in beds provides

possibilities for the wedding arrangements of their guests.

"Once we complete these, it will be possible for the entire wedding party to stay at Camp Hideaway," said Sutherland.

The plan is to build 12 luxury tents that will be heated and cooled, 400 square feet of space per tent, and will feature a private deck and full kitchen.

"We're (also) building a resort pool at the bottom half of the property," said Sutherland.

With the additions in accommodation and amenities, the staff at Camp Hideaway is hoping to diversify the use of the space to include not only weddings, but also family reunions, corporate events and spiritual retreats.

Much of the appeal for a Texas Hill Country wedding venue is the scenery and surrounding landscape. Sutherland pointed out that Camp Hideaway is a short drive from area attractions such as Luckenbach, wineries, and downtown Fredericksburg.

"The lodging on property is a huge selling point," said Fisher about the property's appeal. "A view is a requirement and an outdoor ceremony option. Also, an indoor/outdoor feel."

With a vision for putting their guests first and creating a memorable experience, the staff at Camp Hideaway is invested in a long-term future.

"We're not offering a venue to rent," said Sutherland. "The actual purpose of what everyone on our team is doing is loving people through our hospitality."

Black tie, white florals, silk and satin fabrics are all back in fashion. Trends are leaning away from recent BOHO styles and moving back to classic and simple. This never goes out of fashion, but just takes a break in popularity. It's back for now.

It will be interesting to see how couples pair this style trend against the rustic Hill Country backdrops.

Not surprisingly, after social-distancing with the COVID-19 pandemic, couples are excited to bring their guests together for the mini vacation of a wedding celebration.

Shared experiences are being valued over larger guest counts, posh hotels and extravagance. Unlike other Hill Country towns, Fredericksburg has plenty of boutique lodging and is far enough away from the big city to give a destination feel without international hassle.

"I would totally recommend the venue. If it's within your budget and you have folks from out of town, it really is an incredible venue. The staff is so kind and so professional and very accommodating."


What advice would you give to anyone planning a wedding in the Texas Hill Country?

"For better rates, you can border the peak seasons." We got married in March near to Spring Breaks and stuff was full. Guests had to really book their accommodations ahead of time, and transportation was booked up. We were very cognizant about agriculture, so what the outside looked like for our wedding was very important to me. I was very aware that in early March, everything in the Texas Hill Country had a good chance of still being very dormant, so all the native grasses, the colors would be browns and tans and dark greens."

Any general advice?

"I did a lot of DIY stuff. I would still do some of that. But the details in the end don't matter. As long as you have the big important things in place, and you have cool friends and family that are going to have a good time, then the rest will fall into place."





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A Small Town Love Paxten and Kyle's Wedding Story

Before Paxten Keyser married Kyle Reeh, she claims they were born in the same room of the local hospital. Both grew up in Fredericksburg, with Paxten being one year older than Kyle. They began dating as teenagers.

"We dated in high school, and then she went to college and we kind of went our separate ways," said Kyle. "And then we started seeing each other in college again."

Paxten graduated from Texas State University in San Marcos, and then moved back to Fredericksburg when Kyle graduated from Texas A&M University and began working for his family business, Reeh Plumbing.

On June 11, 2022, the couple officially became Kyle and Paxten Reeh with a wedding at La Bonne Vie Ranch, just south of Fredericksburg.

The Proposal

"I had no idea he was going to propose to me, we hadn't even talked about it," said Paxten about the day they got engaged.

Paxten had just taken her job as a teacher in Kerrville. To celebrate, Kyle's mother invited them to join them for a day at the local wineries.

"He said, 'Before we go meet my mom and brother and his girlfriend at the wineries, let's go by the house, I want to show you these shelves I made," Paxten said.

Kyle had been in a phase of working on home projects and wood crafts, and so the request didn't seem too unusual. They drove to the house, and then Kyle insisted on Paxten being blind-folded. He said that he had worked hard on the shelves and wanted it to be a surprise. Paxten thought it odd, but never suspected a proposal.

"I walked out, and my two best friends and his two best friends were there, and he was on one knee and proposed," Paxton recalled. "I couldn't even post the video because I was so shocked I was saying a lot of bad words."

But the surprise didn't end with the proposal. The group of friends made plans to gather at Hondo's on Main to celebrate the new engagement, but on the way, Kyle insisted on changing his shoes. Both Kyle and Paxten said that their wedding day went smoothly. They valued and recommended the help they had from their wedding planner, Emily Remy of Hill Country Bride.

"Emily made it easy," said Kyle. "She asked the right questions and made us think about what we needed."

Since both couples were local to Fredericksburg, they had over 300 wedding guests, and each had eight members in their wedding parties with two flower girls and two ring bearers.

The large wedding size contributed to, what Paxten described as, the most difficult part of the planning for her. Both had a difficult time narrowing down the final guest list, and some people were left out. Additionally, a lot of people were involved in the vision of the wedding day itself.

"I think the biggest obstacle was making everyone happy, trying to pick what everyone would like," said Paxten.

But all the worries changed on the day of the wedding, as both Kyle and Paxten wanted to have a wedding to enjoy rather than stress over.

"I remember sitting there and all my girls were getting ready," said Paxten. "I was sitting in the middle on this big couch, and just thinking to myself, I'm really going to take all this in because I have no responsibilities right now, and it's going by so fast.

"It really hit me when I was with my girls all morning, and then they leave you. Nobody prepares a bride for that. You're by yourself with just your dad. That was the most nerve-racking part."

Time stood still for both Paxten and Kyle when the doors of the chapel opened and Paxten walked down the aisle.



"I just forgot about everything. I open the doors and I saw everything and then I just saw Kyle, and I forgot the people were there," said Paxten.

That moment was significant for Kyle, as well. "It was emotional," said Kyle. "Obviously, I cried. And I'm not a crier."

A Day to Remember

Both Paxten and Kyle feel that their wedding day went well without any significant hang-ups. Kyle credited good wedding planning as one of the best decisions they made for their wedding.

While neither have any regrets on their wedding day, they expressed a wish that they had done their ceremony a bit earlier to provide more time to visit with guests and enjoy their reception party.

For other couples who would wish to learn from Paxten and Kyle's experience, Paxten feels passionate that couples should try to enjoy the moment while it's there.

"I would say to not worry on the wedding day," said Paxten. "Just take it all in because it goes by so fast. Don't worry about the details."

But for this small-town Fredericksburg couple, their wedding day became the event they both hoped

"Fredericksburg is so beautiful, and the venue was so beautiful," said Paxten. "I wanted it simple. That's what I envisioned.

"My favorite part was walking down the aisle. You dream about this for your whole life. When I opened up (the doors) it was like a dream. And seeing him, and seeing everyone, it was a very good moment."



Founded in 1968, Fredericksburg Rockhounds is an organization devoted to the study and enjoyment of gems, minerals and fossils.




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
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Hill Country Indian Artifact Show

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
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
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Winelovers Trek to Gillespie County for Vino Without an Attitude

Now in its 18th season, Eisbahn will be open through the first weekend of January. Hours will vary throughout the season.

The rink is open from 4-8 p.m. Monday through Thursday during school weeks, 4-10 p.m. on Fri-






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



Bethany Lutheran Church is located at 110 West Austin Street.





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


