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
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FIRST STOP FOR FREDERICKSBURG VISITORS

G uests in Gillespie County should make the Fredericksburg Convention and Visitor Bureau their first stop.

Located at 302 E. Austin St., just one block north of Main Street, visitors can gather all the information they need to learn about the city and the two other organizations that serve the community — the Gillespie County Economic Development Commission and the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce.

Fredericksburg Convention and Visitor Bureau

The Fredericksburg Convention and Visitor Bureau promotes Fredericksburg and Gillespie County as a leisure destination for group tours, reunions, weddings and meeting sites.

The FCVB staffs and operates the Visitor Information Center, which is open Mondays through Saturdays from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and Sundays, 11 a.m.-3 p.m.

This organization is funded by a portion of the city and county hotel/motel occupancy taxes.

Visitors can also gather information on activities, accommodations and businesses of interest through magazines and brochures in the lobby area, including walking tours, historic sites, an events calendar, city and county maps and driving trail maps.

redericksburg has a variety of museums and historic sites for people of all ages to visit. From an overseas war zone to the schools that educated the early settlers to this region, there is something for everyone to learn about.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE PACIFIC WAR

Formerly known as the Nimitz Museum — in honor of Fredericksburg's Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz — the National Museum of the Pacific War sees visitors from all over the world.

The museum teaches the history of the Asiatic-Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II through educational platforms,

connecting to current and future national security issues and facilitates programs to memorialize and support all veterans.

A 33,000-square-foot exhibition area features 40 media installations, approximately 900 artifacts in 97 climate-controlled cases, 15 macro-artifacts and hundreds of photographs.

PIONEER MUSEUM

In the mid-1840s, Germans looking for a different life risked everything to get here, faced every obstacle and created a unique German colony in the heart of the Texas Hill Country.

The Pioneer Museum is a combination museum and historical site on 3.5 acres. It features historic homesteads and buildings donated by founding families of Gillespie County.

 Day Passes are exclusively sold at the Pioneer Museum and the Vereins Kirche Museum. Day Passes are good for 24 hours from the time of purchase and provide entrance to the Pioneer Museum, Vereins Kirche Museum, and Historic Jail (when open for programs).

Among the structures is a oneroom school house, log cabin, Sunday house, bath house, barn and a smokehouse. Artifacts and architecture help to preserve and tell stories.

The Fredericksburg Volunteer Fire Department Museum, which displays pieces of early 20th century fire-fighting equipment, is also housed at the location.



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Many of the schools are still meeting places for local communities. The Rheingold School meets to play dominoes regularly and puts together holiday events, like an egg dying demonstration with natural dyes.

GILLESPIE COUNTY COUNTRY SCHOOLS

Hill Country students of the late 19th and early 20th centuries were educated on everything from the ABCs to arithmetic from one-room schoolhouses.

These structures predate Fredericksburg ISD, Harper ISD and Doss Consolidated Common School District, but still hold a special place in local history.

The sites and memories can still be revisited by taking a trip on the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail.

In 2006, the Gillespie County Commissioners Court established the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail. This trail links the 16 historic former rural schools with the Vereins Kirche.

The Friends of Gillespie County Country Schools, along with several organizations, sponsors the trail and various activities throughout the year so that people can learn more about the county's educational history.

- The driving trail includes schoolhouses such as Cave Creek, Cherry Mountain, Cherry Spring, Crabapple, Grapetown, Junction, Lower South Grape Creek, Luckenbach, Meusebach Creek, Nebgen, Pecan Creek, Rheingold, Williams Creek (Albert), White Oak, Willow City and Wrede.
- The properties are listed in the Register of National Historic Places and are on the Country School Association of America National Schoolhouse Registry.

FORT MARTIN SCOTT STATE HISTORIC SITE

Fort Martin Scott, on the eastern edge of Fredericksburg on the old Pinta Trail, has a rich history of diverse groups of people that shaped Fredericksburg, Gillespie County and the Texas Hill Country.

Through the end of the year, Fort Martin Scott is celebrating its 175th anniversary with special events honoring its heritage.

Throughout the year, the fort comes alive with reenactments, storytelling, education days for schools and special events.

VEREINS KIRCHE

The Vereins Kirche (Society Church) is a unique landmark in the center of downtown Fredericksburg. The octagonal building is owned and managed by the Gillespie County Historical Society (GCHS).

The Vereins Kirche features the history of the building in a permanent exhibit that begins with German immigrants' trip to Texas in the 1840s.

In January 1934, GCHS was formed to rebuild the Vereins Kirche. Since then, it has continued to preserve the history and culture of Fredericksburg and Gillespie County through exhibits and educational programs, and outreach. The building last underwent extensive restoration in 2019.

The original Vereins Kirche was used primarily as a church and school for Catholic and Evangelical Protestants. School districts were created in Gillespie County in the 1850s and students stopped using the Vereins Kirche. As with the schools, church congregations began building their own churches in town and slowly leaving the Vereins Kirche empty

most days.

By the town's 50th anniversary in 1896, the stone walls were removed to make the Vereins Kirche a pavilion for the celebration. The building was torn down in 1897 after it fell into disrepair.

When GCHS received its charter in 1934, it began working to rebuild the Vereins Kirche as a pioneer memorial. Fundraising by citizens and help from the New Deal Public Works Administration supported the construction of the Vereins Kirche. At a celebration in May 1935, the Vereins Kirche Pioneer Memorial officially opened.


The first use of the new Vereins Kirche was to house Pioneer Memorial Library and a small historical museum. The first exhibits included memorabilia and collectibles from early pioneer days.

When the Gillespie County Historical purchased the Kammlah Homestead in 1955, most of its artifacts were moved and displayed in the Kammlah House. A small exhibit space remained in the Vereins Kirche.

General Information

- The Vereins Kirche is open six days a week, yearround, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., closed on Sundays.
- There is an admission fee of \$5. Tickets can be purchased at the Vereins Kirche or at Pioneer Museum, 325 West Main Street.

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
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



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ill Country travelers frequent the attractions Luckenbach has to offer, much like Willie, Waylon and the boys did in 1977.

Known for its "Everybody's Somebody" attitude and live entertainment, Luckenbach Texas is a popular destination for music fans, bikers and all those interested in discovering the tiny town in the tune heard by millions.

With its store, dance hall and picnic tables underneath arching live oak trees, Luckenbach (a sign jokes "Population 3") is a destination in its own.

Open daily at 9 a.m., the family-friendly store offers visitors an old-fashioned experience and merchandise ranging from the nostalgic to items bearing the town's oval-shaped logo.

The town also hosts regional and national acts. During quieter times, one can find a picker's circle for those who want to swap tunes and musically mingle with the locals.

With nearly daily performances on the outside stage or in the dancehall, visitors can sit back and enjoy a beverage of choice while enjoying the musicians who provide tunes with a Texas flair.

History

Luckenbach began in 1852 when Jacob Luckenbach and his brothers, William and August, moved to the area from Fredericksburg and began farming.

William Luckenbach opened a post office under the name of South Grape Creek in 1854 which operated for 11 years.

In 1886, August Engel Jr. reopened a post office for the community along with a general store in the Engel homestead. It was named Luckenbach by Minna Engel, who had recently married Carl Albert Luckenbach.

Engel and his descendants later moved the post office and general store down the street and added a blacksmith shop, dance hall and cotton gin.

In the 1970s, the Engel family sold the town to Hondo Crouch, Kathy Morgan and Guich Koock.

During the years that followed, Luckenbach gained national attention as a "metropolis of mirth," thanks in large part to Crouch's far-reaching humor and charismatic personality.

Jerry Jeff Walker later enhanced the town's reputation by recording his live album, "Viva Terlingua," there 50 years ago.

From 1995 through 1999, Willie Nelson held his storied Fourth of July Picnic at Luckenbach.

Today, one can find local and traveling musicians on stage or at the Picker's Circle, a weekend dance in the hall or one of the many events on the calendar.

BEHIND THE NAMES: FREDERICKSBURG'S STREET NAMES

o most, it's just two signs on a corner. But have you ever wondered how Fredericksburg named its streets?

In the early days, town planners encoded friendly messages when selecting names for the thoroughfares.

Most of the city byways have large signs showing the name of the street and an illustration of the Vereins Kirche, a symbol of Fredericksburg that stands in the center of the city on Marktplatz.

Among the more German names of streets is Ufer, which runs parallel to Main Street, three blocks south. In English, Ufer means stream bank and undoubtedly was named because it runs along the southern bank of Barons Creek.

Originally, the street that runs along the north side of the creek was likely called Bach Strasse, but was translated to Creek Street when the city incorporated in 1933 and the streets were officially named.

The Fredericksburg Lions Club took on the naming of all the streets and its members purchased and installed street signs.

They decided to name the streets running north and south across Main to spell out words.

Starting at Courthouse Square, all the streets crossing Main to the east were named so that their first letters would spell out "All Welcome" — Adams, Llano, Lincoln, Washington, Elk, Lee, Columbus, Olive, Mesquite and Eagle.

Traveling west from the square, the streets spell out "Come Back" — Crockett, Orange, Milam, Edison, Bowie, Acorn, Cherry and Kay.

Many streets are namesakes of trees — Mesquite,

Cherry, Cottonwood, Hackberry, Liveoak, Mulberry, Apple, Orange, Plum, Pear, Pecan, Poplar, Spruce, Sycamore and Walnut. Naturally, there is a street named Peach, in honor of the county's most popular and prolific fruit.

There is an Elk Street and a Deerwood Street, but no deer street.

Several streets are named for famous native son Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, including Nimitz Street, Nimitz Drive, Nimitz Circle and Nimitz Parkway.

There is a Bunny Drive, in the shadow of Cross Mountain, which was named for the city's Easter Fires characters.

There are also some unusual street names, such as Kraupahen, a contraction of the names of Mayor Edward Krauskopf and Commissioners Willie Pape and Max T. Henke, who were in office in that era.


And when the new Fredericksburg Post Office was built, the city named a street there "Theodore Specht Drive" in honor of the city's first postmaster.

Some streets were named before the project began in the early 1930s, among them San Antonio, Travis and Austin Streets, which retained their names. What is known today as Main Street was originally San Saba Street.

Despite gaining metropolitan ways over the decades, Fredericksburg still thinks of itself as a small town, where most people know each other and where people live.

LIBRARY GIVES RESIDENTS A PLACE TO GATHER

oused in the former Gillespie County Courthouse, the historic two-story Pioneer Memorial Library building has transitioned into a hangout spot for the community.

Located next to the Gillespie County Courthouse at 115 West Main Street, the library, which was built in 1882 and renovated twice in the 1900s, welcomes guests of all ages to read and explore thousands of books.

Library cards are free of charge to residents of Gillespie County with proof of residency — such as a driver's license.

Children, ages six and over, can get their cards with a parent or legal guardian's signature.

Books can be checked out for two weeks, and if not requested by another library user, may be renewed for another two weeks.

Residents of the immediately surrounding counties (Kimble, Mason, Llano, Blanco, Kendall and Kerr) are also eligible to use the library's resources for a \$5 fee.

VISIT THE NATION'S LARGEST WORKING WILDFLOWER FARM

W ildseed Farms in Fredericksburg has over 35 years of wildflower seed production experience.

Wildseed Farms is now one of the largest plant nurseries in Central Texas.

The farm is located at 100 Legacy Drive and is open every day from 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Wildseed Farms was founded in Eagle Lake, Texas in 1982, by John and Marilyn Thomas after they spent seven years in Eagle Lake working on a family rice and cattle farm.

John Thomas' knowledge of farming led him to plant wildflowers initially on his property in Eagle Lake as a fun project.

In 1982, curious passersby noticed his beautiful wildflowers growing on his property. His farm attracted people from near and far, clogging the small roadways in Eagle Lake.

In 1993, Wildseed Farms was created in Fredericksburg on 217 acres with the intention to make beautiful wildflowers more accessible at a cheaper rate for businesses and the residents of Fredericksburg.

The farm currently has more than 1,000 cultivated acres in Texas between the two facilities.

Wildseed Farms touts itself as being the "Nations Largest Working Wildflower Farm."

Speaking of seeds, Wildseed Farms offers highquality non-GMO wildflower seeds and hard-to-find native grasses inside of their on-site gift shop.

Wildseed Farms is one of the world's largest producers of Texas Bluebonnets.

Additional fruit, vegetable and culinary herb seeds are sold on site.

Visitors to the farm and market center will see fields of wildflowers blooming from March through October. The farm also offers a boutique, the Lantana Nursery and the Brewbonnet Biergarten, with a little bit of everything for the whole family.

Visitors to the farm can explore the walking trails and take photos while sipping on a glass of cold wine or any other refreshment.

The farm also began growing grapes in 2015 to help with the growing Texas Hill Country grape business. The farm now boasts a tasting room, featuring a variety of Hill Country wines.

Over 40 acres of grapes are on site with future expansions in the works.

hether you're looking to lounge in the shade, catch a baseball game or play with your canine companion, the City of Fredericksburg has a park for you.

Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park

The 330-acre Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park is the crown jewel of the City of Fredericksburg's parks system. Admission to the park is free.

Ten acres of the park are dedicated to the Fredericksburg Nature Center, which is home to 11 types of natural habitats. Three trails take hikers across Live Oak Creek, giving visitors a chance to experience the geologic and biologic diversity.

A 17-acre lake offers plenty of spots to wet a line. Motorboats, however, are prohibited, as are trotlines and swimming.

Play a pickup game on the outdoor basketball courts or a volleyball match on the sand court. Baseball and softball fields can be reserved or used as available. Though the pool is closed during fall and winter, guests can catch a tennis or pickle ball game at the courts nearby.

Five acres of the park are a dedicated dog park, the result of a collaboration between the City of Fredericksburg and the Fredericksburg Dog Park Association.

The park asks all visitors to clean up after their pets. Visitors who plan large gatherings may want to use one of two indoor sites, the Tatsch House or Pioneer Pavilion or one of the park's five large outdoor covered pavilions.

Each of the five outdoor pavilions is available on a first-come first-served basis or by reservation.

For those looking for a longer stay, there are 98 RV spaces available for travel trailers with 30-50 amp electrical hookups, water and sewer, cable TV, free wireless Internet and shade trees.

All campers must check in at the park office to receive a camping permit.


There are nine comfort stations to serve visitors. and three bathhouses.

Pets are welcome but must be kept on a leash.

The nickname "Kreuzberg," Cross Mountain, was given to the landmark during the settling of Fredericksburg. A cross, originally made of wood, has existed in some form on the mountain since 1847.

The cross was replaced in February 2024, as a collaboration between the city and the Nimitz Rotary

The park offers several trails, three picnic areas, an overlook and restrooms.

The park is open from dawn until dusk and is free to enter. Pets are welcome, but must be kept on a leash.

Old Fair Park

At the corner of Ufer and Lincoln Streets is Old Fair Park, a facility dedicated to sports.

Facilities include lighted baseball and softball fields, concession stands and playgrounds.

Hours of operation are 5 a.m. to midnight, daily.

Guests are welcome to use the fields when not reserved. Reservations can be made online, or by emailing Katelyn Brazell, recreation superintendent, at kbrazell@fbgtx.org.

Oak Crest Park

Oak Crest Park, located on Texas 16 South, is another city facility dedicated to sports.

Amenities include lighted baseball, softball and soccer fields, some with covered bleachers, a concession stand and a covered playground.

The playground, dedicated in 2012, is named for fallen soldier Chris Staats.

Reservations for Oak Crest can be made online or by contacting Katelyn Brazell, recreation superintendent, at kbrazell@fbgtx.org.

Elementary School Park

Located at Fredericksburg Elementary School, this park is a collaboration between Fredericksburg Independent School District and the city.

Amenities include a playground, pavilion, restrooms, trails, practice fields and an outdoor basketball court.

Frantzen Park

Originally called the Orange Street Park, this quiet lot was donated to the city by Alex and Laura Frantzen in 1956.

The park includes a green space, walking path and picnic areas.

The park, owned and managed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), features historical exhibits, memorabilia and a living history farm with recreational sports, nature trails and bicycling opportunities and

Honoring a president

The LBJ State Park and Historic Site honors Gillespie County native Lyndon B. Johnson, the 36th President of the United States.

A Visitor Center complex houses exhibits and memorabilia focusing on the late president's two terms of office.

Park facilities

The Visitor Center is the first stop for any tour to the LBJ Ranch, which is a part of the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park.

Attached to the Visitor Center is the Behrens Cabin, a two-room dogtrot cabin built during the 1840s by German immigrant Johannes Behrens.

There's also an outdoor amphitheater used for a variety of programs.

Numerous shaded picnic and rest areas, some with bathroom facilities, are available at the







state park.

From early June through the summer, a large pool facility - complete with a children's wading pool and a covered pavilion - is manned by certified lifeguards.

Nearby are two lighted tennis courts.

The park's dining hall and group picnic area are available by reservation, and are located on the banks of the Pedernales River, as well as a separate baseball diamond facility.

Fishing is allowed without a license from the banks of state park lands. However, those who go into the waterways on a boat must have a fishing license.

Living history

The park is also home to the World War I-era Sauer-Beckmann Farm. Here, rangers care for animals, grow crops and cook meals, all in period clothing.

The farm is named after the Sauer family, who moved to the Hill Country in 1869. On their land, they built the two-story home, a smokehouse and tank house.

In 1900, the Sauers sold the property to the other namesake family, the Beckmanns. They lived and worked at the farm, planting cotton, building a new barn and adding a Victorian home before descendants eventually sold the site to TPWD.

Nature trails

Elsewhere in the park, a winding nature trail leads walkers to a larger-than-life bronze statue of the former president overlooking the Pedernales River.


The trail also winds near a wildlife enclosure housing American bison and other areas with members of the Official State of Texas Longhorn Herd.

Another trail approximately a mile long is handicapped accessible and suitable for wheelchairs and strollers. It departs the Visitor Center and travels through fields of wildflowers and past the Texas Longhorns' pen to the Danz cabins.

Every trail in the park is marked with directional signs and markers giving brief highlights of the path. Leashed pets are welcomed but are not allowed inside buildings.






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- Visitors can challenge themselves to a hike to the top of the dome.
- The park has its main campground which includes restroom facilities, but also primitive camping sites throughout the park. (Humans have camped in the area for 12,000 years.) Burn bans are in effect during dry times.
- Trails, including the dome hike or the 4½-mile Loop Trail, wind throughout the park. Guided hikes are also offered. (Check the Events page on the park website for more events.)
- Technical rock climbers also are welcomed to this popular site. (Waiver forms must be signed at the front office.)
- The park is a nature lover's paradise, with vernal pools, native plants and hundreds of bird species to view.
- ERSNA also is one of just two state parks to be designated an International Dark Sky Park. It regularly hosts members of the Hill Country Astronomers group, who help visitors see "the stars at night, big and bright."

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


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The white farmhouse, above, is a reconstruction of Johnson's birthplace. Below, is a plaque outside the Johnson Family Cemetery.



M ade up of two visitor areas, one in Johnson City and one in Stonewall, the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park is full of opportunities to learn about the life and legacy of the 36th president with no fees.

LBJ Ranch

The LBJ Ranch, located at 1472 State Park Road 52 in Stonewall, is the birth and death place of the former president.

Visitors can tour the ranch home in their vehicle. with stops along the way including the president's birthplace, the Johnson family cemetery and the president's first school.

The Texas White House and Airplane Hangar are temporarily closed to the public while they undergo restorations.

The ranch remains open seven days a week, and free driving permits and maps can be picked up just down the road at the LBJ State Park and Historic Site Visitor Center, 199 Park Road 52, Stonewall. More information on the state park can be found elsewhere in the visitor guide.

Driving permits can be picked up between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Ranch entrance gates are open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and the ranch exit gate closes at 5 p.m.

Johnson City

The other half of the park, located in Johnson City, includes the national park visitor center, LBJ's boyhood home and the Johnson Settlement, where the president's grandparents settled in the 1860s.

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













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he fall repertoire of the Fredericksburg Theater Company (FTC) 28th season highlights wordsmiths from the 1900s and ends with a play written in the 21st century.

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TEXAS HUNTING SEASON OUTLOOK POSITIVE

exas issues the most hunting licenses, tags, permits and stamps in the nation with over 1.1 million, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service data

And this year's timely rainfall has set the stage for a positive fall hunting season, despite the drought conditions throughout the state.

The eastern portions of the state have seen abovenormal precipitation since January.

"Many times, it's not even how much rain an area receives, but when they receive it," said Jacob Dykes, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist in Corpus Christi. "Late winter and spring rains greatly facilitate the growth of vegetation that provides both nutrition and habitat cover needed for a wide range of species."

White-tailed deer

With a statewide population of roughly five million, Texas is home to more white-tailed deer than any other U.S. state.

Thanks to mostly positive environmental conditions leading up to the summer fawning season, Dykes said much of the state should see an abundance of new, healthy additions to the population for hunting season, which begins Nov. 2. The archery hunting season is Sept. 29-Nov. 1 and youth-only hunts start Oct. 2.

Quail

While annual quail populations naturally fluctuate, Texas has seen a steady decline in both bobwhite and scaled quail over the past three decades, Dykes said.

Turkey

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reported increased turkey nesting success and recruitment in 2023, thanks to abundant acorn production and warm, late winter conditions across much of the Rio Grande wild turkey range. Turkey season hunting begins Nov. 2, with archeryonly hunts starting Sept. 28.

Dove

The 2023 dove season was a good one, and based on the latest Texas Parks and Wildlife Department dove surveys, the 2024 season, which began Sunday, Sept. 1, shows great promise.

Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists estimate statewide populations of roughly 34 million mourning doves and a record-high 13 million white-wing doves.

Changes to rules and regulations

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved hunting regulations for the 2024-25 season with some modifications and clarifications to 2024-25 Statewide Hunting and Migratory Game Bird proclamations.


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
















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SOUNDS OF FALL & WINTER INCLUDE **GERMAN CHOIRS**


Both choirs also appear regularly at Oktoberfest, and give performances from time to time during the year at nursing and retirement homes.

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


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

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






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SANTA CLAUS **COMES TO TOWN IN** THE ANNUAL **CHRISTMAS PARADE**

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


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SINGING TREE SPREADS HOLIDAY CHEER

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

he 55th annual LBJ Tree Lighting event will be held Sunday, Dec. 15, at 5:30 p.m.

Taking place at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park and Historic Site in Stonewall, the event will give locals and visitors a chance to enjoy carolers, a live nativity, Santa Claus, refreshments and, of course, the tree lighting itself.

In addition to the tree lighting, the Sauer-Beckmann Living History Farm inside the state park will be open to visitors.


At the Sauer-Beckmann Farm, state park personnel dressed in the style of the early 1900s will greet visitors for a walking tour through the houses.

In another room, visitors will find angel chimes and an advent wreath made of cedar. In the center of the kitchen, the dining table will be laden with foods that have been prepared by park employees.



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
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ZWEITE WEIHNACHTEN **OFFERS A 'SECOND' CHRISTMAS EVENT**

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
