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

amilies and crowds routinely come into town to get the feel of Fredericksburg in spring. It's a season of nature, nectar and romance.

A lot of the appeal of our small Burg has to do with its plentiful bluebonnets, peaches, wine and beer. Many people make our town their home away from home with extended stays in one of our 1,000-plus B&Bs or guest houses.

Fredericksburg draws more than 1.5 million visitors each year. Some come because we're an agricultural and viticultural destination, while others come for our beautiful outdoor attractions and numerous celebrations hosted in our city and county.

As an agricultural and viticultural destination, Fredericksburg businesses have flourished. That includes, of course, the grapes one might enjoy while visiting a vineyard or winery. But the hordes of visitors began with the roadside peach stands that can still be found today, with thousands seeking those sweet and juicy treasures that come from our peach farmers.

Hunters also have come to the Hill Country for decades to harvest deer in what is a multi-generational tradition for many Texas families.

B&Bs began in the late 1970s. Shopping, the beautiful outdoors, music and festivals reflecting local culture drove even more people to Fredericksburg as the years progressed.

We want this magazine, which began publishing in 1978, to reflect most all of what makes Fredericksburg special. We're pleased that our efforts have been recognized by the Texas Press Association on multiple occasions. Our company's sister magazine, Rock & Vine, explores more of what the Hill Country region has to offer.

#### A SIP OF LOCAL HISTORY

Fredericksburg has been a "wet" city, not for the rain that falls, but of the German spirit where suds and good times went together naturally.

Our wine industry is booming now. But before Prohibition hit Texas in 1918, Fredericksburg had three breweries.

Captain Charles Nimitz, the grandfather of our World War II hero, Admiral Chester Nimitz, ran the Nimitz Hotel. It had a copper-tank brewery in the basement, but supply shortages during the Civil War forced him to close it in 1861.

Frederick Probst paired up with Dr. Adolph Assig to brew at a property at 310 West Austin Street which had a brewery with three cellars where they made a popular *weissbier*. Assig later moved to Blanco, but Probst continued to serve local patrons.

John Knopp opened a saloon at the corner of Main and Milam streets and began to import cheaper beer from San Antonio (5 cents a glass, versus 10 for the Probst brew). Frugal Germans made their choice and Probst closed his brewery in 1895.

Henry Warner and John Mauer owned a brewery in Marlin, but located here in 1875. They operated a lager beer brewery in the 400 block of East Creek Street for nine years. It's believed Warner died in 1877 and Mauer likely headed west to El Paso.

Today, Fredericksburg boasts operations ranging from the castlelike Altstadt Brewery, which is an amazing place to visit, to Main Street's Fredericksburg Brewing Company, which has tasty brews and was one of the fathers of the current craft beer boom.

Don't forget about the June 8 Fredericksburg Craft Beer Festival, the third annual event that helps out local charities. Plan a return trip and join us in a toast.

For those of us who enjoy the suds, we're glad this is a "wet" town. *Prost!*

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## SPRING AND SUMMER WEATHER FORECAST

**S** pring and summer are typically defined by gradually warming weather conditions during March, April, and May.

June, July, and August are characterized by the hottest temperatures of the year and erratic rainfall patterns that are usually dictated by afternoon heating storms and potential tropical systems.

#### **MARCH WEATHER**

March is typically drier than the rest of the months.

The 30-year rainfall average for the month of March is 2.50" and can vary from a trace up to 10 inches of rain in extreme cases.

Rainfall in March typically comes from cold fronts moving through in squall lines and periodic fog and drizzle situations.

There are usually one or two bouts of severe weather that can produce some hail and strong winds.

Speaking of winds, it is usually one of the windiest months of the year and it is breezy fairly often during March.

Average temperatures are in the 30s at the beginning of the month, warming to the 40s by the end of the month.

Highs generally warm into the 70s and 80s with sharp cold fronts still possible at times.

A few mornings are susceptible to frost during the month.

In rare cases, it can still snow in March, but that's not common.

#### **APRIL WEATHER**

April is one of the more volatile weather months of the year.

Severe weather is common across Texas during the month of April as humidity values increase from the Gulf of Mexico.

Storms can produce heavy rainfall, hail, and isolated tornadoes in isolated cases.

30-year rainfall averages for April are 2.55".

In between storms, it is usually warm with highs in the 70s and 80s, with lows in the 40s early in the month followed by 50s at the end of the month.

Extremes can include lows near or below freezing some years, and highs near 100 in rare cases.

#### **MAY WEATHER**

May is one of the two wettest months of the year on average.

May averages 4.26" of rain over the past 30 years.

Lack of rainfall in May can lead to very hot soil temperatures and hotter daytime highs in the summer.

Severe thunderstorms peak in May with cold fronts being the main culprit, along with the West Texas dry line.

Large hail can fall with some of the May storms.

Although storms are possible, the weather in May is usually more humid, and highs warm into the 80s and 90s late in the month.

#### JUNE WEATHER

June is when things start cooking. Rain chances continue sporadically before summer patterns settle in.

Highs warm into the 90s often and we can see 100s at times, especially late in the month.

June average rainfall totals are 2.98". Summer storms can produce lightning and strong wind gusts.

#### **JULY WEATHER**

July is simply very hot for the most part.

Lows hold in the 60s and 70s with highs in the 90s and possibly 100s on occasion.

Storms usually pop up in nature with the 30-year average at 1.88".

#### **AUGUST WEATHER**

The first part of August is usually the hottest time of the year.

Highs warm into the 90s daily with a few 100s possible.

Lows hold in the 70s and maybe a few 60s.

Stray storms can produce lightning and strong wind gusts.

The 30-year rainfall average for August is 2.42".

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
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### GETTING BACK TO THE BASICS

## LUCKENBACH, TEXAS AND ITS LAID BACK ATTITUDE



With its store, dance hall and picnic tables underneath arching live oak trees, Luckenbach is a popular destination for music fans, bikers and those interested in the fame of the tiny town.

Open daily at 9 a.m., the family-friendly store offers visitors an old-fashioned experience and merchandise ranging from the nostalgic to items bearing the town's famed oval-shaped logo.

The town also hosts regional and national acts. During quieter times, guests can sit and listen, or join in, to a picker's circle where musicians mingle and swap tunes.

With nearly daily performances on

the outside stage or in the dancehall, visitors can sit back and enjoy a beverage of choice while enjoying the musicians who provide tunes with a Texas flair.

#### HISTORY

Luckenbach began in 1852 when Jacob Luckenbach and his brothers, William and August, moved to the area from Fredericksburg and began farming.

William Luckenbach opened a post office under the name of South Grape Creek in 1854 and it operated for 11 years.

In 1886, August Engel Jr. reopened a post office for the community along with a general store in the Engel homestead. It was named Luckenbach by Minna Engel, who had just married Carl Albert Luckenbach.

Engel and his descendants later moved the post office and general store down the street and added a

blacksmith shop, dance hall and cotton gin.

In the 1970s, the Engel family sold the town to Hondo Crouch, Kathy Morgan and Guich Koock.

During the years that followed, Luckenbach gained national attention as a "metropolis of mirth," thanks in a large part to Crouch's far-reaching humor and charismatic personality.

Jerry Jeff Walker, a friend of Crouch, further enhanced the town's reputation by recording his live album there, "Viva Terlingua,"

From 1995 through 1999, Willie Nelson held his storied Fourth of July Picnic at Luckenbach.

Today, one can find local and traveling musicians on stage or at a Picker's Circle, a weekend dance in the hall or one of the many special events the town has scheduled.

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
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The National Museum of the Pacific War tells the story of how World War II was won in the Pacific. It interweaves histories of America, China, Japan and Korea.

The museum formerly known as the

The museum, formerly known as the Nimitz Museum, for Fredericksburg's own, Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, is located at 340 East Main Street.

Exhibitions honor the more than 100,000 Americans who gave their lives in the war by "truthfully and

respectfully telling the story of their struggles, their sacrifices and their triumphs."

The eight million Americans who served in World War II are honored, as well. It preserves the memories of all who served and never returned home.

The museum's 33,000-squarefoot exhibit area features 40 media installations, approximately 900 artifacts in 97 climate-controlled cases, 15 macro-artifacts and hundreds of photographs.

An eight-foot bronze statue in Nimitz Platz memorializes Nimitz and greets visitors at the front of the building. The Admiral Nimitz Museum houses the Cailloux Education Center, Admiral Nimitz Grand Ballroom and Mezzanine.

The six-acre museum includes the Admiral Nimitz Museum, George H.W. Bush Gallery, Japanese Garden of Peace, Memorial Courtyard, Plaza of Presidents, Nimitz Education and Research Center and the Pacific Combat Zone.

Exhibits in the George H.W. Bush Gallery convey the shock and destruction of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. An HA-19, one of the five Japanese two-man submarines that took part in the attack, is in the gallery.

The museum teaches the history and lessons learned from the Asiatic-Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II and offers educational platforms that consider current and potential national security issues.

The Memorial Courtyard remembers the soldiers, ships and units in the Pacific Theater.

The archives of the National Museum of the Pacific War hold thousands of manuscripts, official documents, photographs and recorded interviews with Pacific War veterans. The Nimitz Education and Research Center, where the archives are, is open to the public by appointment.

#### **EXHIBITIONS**

The PT 309 boat exhibit allows guests onto the deck of a boat tender equipped for a mission.

This exhibit includes video displays and oral histories of PT 309 "Oh Frankie," the boat on display, and others.

The TBM Avenger exhibit takes museum-goers below deck of an aircraft carrier ready for a mission.

Visitors can test their skills on tabletop games stationed in front of the plane.

They can launch torpedoes at enemy ships, defend a ship from enemy attack by manning an anti-aircraft gun, and land the pilot safely on the deck by waiving him in on his approach.

This exhibit also includes video displays, information panels about flight missions and artifacts.

#### PACIFIC COMBAT ZONE

Two blocks east of the main museum. at the Pacific Combat Zone, living history reenactments put viewers on the front line. The WWII Pacific Combat Program features 60-minute shows that immerse visitors in battle. They show equipment, weapons and tactics of the U.S. Army and Marines and the Imperial Japanese Army.

The Pacific Combat Zone, one of the museum's most popular venues, is a unique two-acre indoor and outdoor exhibit.

The live reenactments are staged eight times a year on the weekends and feature history and details on weapons used during the war, as well as a display of the weapons being used.

Guests can spend as long as they

would like exploring exhibits in Phase

In March 2017, the museum finished its \$8 million renovation to the complex.

Admission for the show is \$10 for adults; \$5 for students and children; and free for children five and under and WWII veterans. Ear plugs are provided.

Advance tickets are available at the George H.W. Bush Gallery or the Admiral Nimitz Museum, Walk-up tickets are sometimes available at the combat zone prior to the program.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

The National Museum of the Pacific War is open Wednesday through Monday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., except for Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas.

Admission is free for WWII veterans. Tickets for senior citizens 65 and older are \$14; adults are \$18; military members (active or retired) with an I.D. are \$12; children six and over and students who have ID, are \$8; children five and under are admitted free of charge.



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

# COMING IN FOR A LANDING

# GILLESPIE COUNTY AIRPORT PROVIDES SERVICES FOR RESIDENTS, VISITORS AND BUSINESS

Gillespie County Airport serves as a gateway to the Texas Hill Country for jet setters, aviation hobbyists and visitors, alike.

Corporate jets, single engine aircraft and pilots of a variety of other types of aircraft are all accommodated at the facility, located at 191 Airport Road, just south of downtown Fredericksburg on Texas Highway 16. (The facility sits between the Gillespie County Fair Grounds and Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park.)

Classed as a general aviation airport, it features a 5,000-foot-runway and full-length parallel taxiway and has runway lights and a beacon that operate from sunset to sunrise, giving the airport a 24-hours-a-day, sevendays-a-week, operational capability. During daylight hours of limited visibility, the lights can be turned on by the approaching pilot.

Instrument approaches are available at both ends of the runway, and precision approach path indicators provide pilots with visual assistance during night landing operations.

A fully automated weather system (AWOS) informs pilots about local conditions.

Operated under Gillespie County government, the facility has seen constant upgrades and expansions as it services more and more pilots.

The airport's terminal building provides a comfortable environment for pilots, crew members and passengers waiting on aircraft.

An additional convenience is available with the credit card-operated refueling system that provides aviation gasoline (100LL) and jet fuel 24 hours a day.

Airport manager Tony Lombardi can provide information on all airport operations. The airport has 80 tiedown positions for public use. Longterm T-hangar spaces are available through three different entities.

A unique characteristic of this nonmetropolitan airport is the adjacent Hangar Hotel and Conference Center which boasts 50 upscale guest rooms, an officer's club, meeting facilities for large groups and a classic 1940s-style diner.

Businesses at the airport include the Pippen-York Flying Machine Company, which provides avionics installation and repair, and Tac-Aero, which provides major and minor airframe and engine repair.

The Gillespie County Airport also features the Fredericksburg FBO, a full-service fixed-based operator that provides fuel service, information and service to pilots and crews. It also has three 12,000-square-foot and two 10,000-square-foot corporate aircraft storage hangars. FBO is planning to add additional storage space within the next months.

Ground transportation options include rental cars from The Motor Pool at Fredericksburg FBO.



## A PIECE OF HISTORY BEHIND BARS

he Historic Jail is a glimpse back in time into Fredericksburg's history. The jail sits at 117 W. San Antonio St. and is the fourth Gillespie County Jail, built in 1885.

The county's first jail was built in 1852, six years before the founding of Fredericksburg and was located near the current City Hall.

A second jail was built in 1859 and was located behind the first Gillespie County Courthouse.

By 1870, plans were underway for yet another Gillespie County Jail. In 1874, the third Gillespie County Jail was completed, but in 1885 completely burned in a fire.

The Historic Jail was built

immediately after and was completed in 1885. It is 25 feet wide, 35 feet deep, and 20 to 22 feet high with two stories.

The ground floor has four rooms. One was used for lockup and others for the jailer. On the second floor are steelclad cells. The jail has a heavy solid steel plate door and another one with bars at the front entrance.

Cells in the jail include the lockup cell on the ground floor, later used for female inmates. The upstairs also includes a maximum-security cell in the back portion of the second floor.

Surrounding the jail is a five-foot stone wall, originally embedded with broken glass to discourage prisoner escape.

The last inmate of the Historic Jail was transported to the fifth Gillespie County Jail, located in the third Gillespie County Courthouse upon its completion in 1939.

Today, the Historic Jail is owned and maintained by Gillespie County under the care of the Gillespie County Commissioners Court. The Gillespie County Historical Society provides public access and interpretation of the building.

Haunted Fredericksburg Ghost Walk and Jail Tour also provides a unique tour experience of the historic building.

## LIBRARY SPEAKS PIONEER MEMORIAL LIBRARY OFFERS **VOLUMES**

Located next to the Gillespie County Courthouse at 115 West Main Street, the library welcomes guests of all ages to read and explore thousands of items in its collection.

#### **SERVICES**

Adults and children age 6 and above who live in Gillespie County can obtain a library card at no charge. All children must have their card signed by a parent or guardian when filling out a card application.

Visitors to Gillespie County who stay for three months or longer can enjoy library privileges after paying a \$5 fee. Non-residents of Gillespie County (residents of Blanco, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Llano and Mason) can obtain a card for a \$5 fee.

Books may be checked out for two weeks, and if not requested by another library user, may be renewed for another two weeks.

#### YOUTH

Young readers can find their own exclusive area on the first floor. Picture books, stories for children, and fiction and non-fiction reads for older kids are featured.

Special events for children are often held, and a schedule of programs can be found at the library's central desk or on the library's website: http://www1. youseemore.com/pioneer/

#### **ADULTS**

Adult fiction and non-fiction books, reference materials, the Texas collection, magazines and periodicals are located on the second floor, accessible by stairs or elevator.

#### LIBRARY 'FRIENDS'

In addition to being a department of the County of Gillespie, the library is supported by the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library.

Annual membership in the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library is open to all at a nominal cost.

### **QUIET HAVEN AWAY** FROM THE BUSTLE OF MAIN STREET

#### LIBRARY HISTORY

Pioneer Memorial Library is housed in a former Gillespie County Courthouse, which was designed by Alfred Giles.

The historic building served as the courthouse from 1882 until 1939, when the courthouse shifted to a its current location next door.

Various governmental organizations occupied the building until it was closed in 1963.

Two years later, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McDermott of Dallas funded the preservation of the building so that it could be used as a public library. It was dedicated in May 1967.

In 1983, Mrs. McDermott provided a challenge for a matching grant so that renovations and expansion to the second floor could be accomplished. The community responded, and the renovated library was dedicated in December 1984.





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### A STEP BACK IN TIME

#### PIONEER MUSEUM FEATURES EXHIBITS ON EARLY LIFE

n the mid-1840s, Germans looking for a different life were reading and hearing about Texas as a land of opportunity, and they risked everything to get here, faced every obstacle and created a unique German colony in the heart of the Texas Hill Country.

The Pioneer Museum is a combination museum and historical site on 3.5 acres. It features historic homesteads and buildings donated by founding families of Gillespie County.

Among the structures is a one-room school house, log cabin, Sunday house, bath house, barn and a smokehouse. Artifacts and architecture help to preserve and tell stories.

The Fredericksburg Volunteer Fire Department Museum, which displays pieces of early 20th century fire-fighting equipment, is also housed at the location.

#### **VEREINS KIRCHE MUSEUM**

Just two blocks away from the main grounds is the Vereins Kirche (Society Church), in the middle of the town square, Marktplatz. The building is a replica of the first that was constructed by pioneers.

The original, built in 1847, served as a combination church, school and community center for decades. The replica was built in 1935, and launched the Gillespie County Historical Society.

#### HISTORIC COUNTY JAIL

The Historic Jail was completed in December 1885. The building is 25 feet wide, 35 feet deep, and 20 to 22 feet high with two stories. The jail is open on the first Saturday of each month from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

#### **KIDS' PROGRAMS**

Little Pioneers programs bring Gillespie County history to life for children with hands-on, interactive activities like blacksmithing, quilting, weaving, animal husbandry, stitching, baking and candle making.

The museum also celebrates the holidays with Kinderfest at Christmas time, and an Easter Egg hunt in spring.

There's something for kids every month during the school year and weekly in summer.

#### **ARCHIVES AND RESEARCH**

The Gillespie County Historical Society (GCHS) houses archives pertaining to the life and culture of German settlers in Gillespie County. GCHS encourages the public to take advantage of the resources, which includes almost 70,000 individual items. The museum also sells copies of historic images and research materials for various projects.

#### LIVING HISTORY DAYS

Pioneer Museum hosts Living History days monthly and as program events throughout the year.

Living history presenters from the Frontier History Company Foundation are at both the Pioneer Museum and the Historic Jail on the first Saturday of every month, 10 a.m.-3 p.m. A Pioneer Museum Day Pass provides access to both locations and the presentations.

Handwerkers are on museum grounds on these first Saturdays from 10 a.m.-noon, working on handwork projects like needlepoint, bobbin lace, embroidery, cross stitch, knitting and crochet.

The most popular Living History days are Founders Day (early May) and Spring Break week (mid-March).

These museum programs showcase the living history presenters from the Frontier History Company Foundation, as well as blacksmiths, rope makers, chuckwagon cooks, spinners, handwerkers, corn shellers and more.

#### **PLAN YOUR VISIT**

Day passes are exclusively sold at Pioneer Museum and the Vereins Kirche Museum and are good for 24 hours from the time of purchase. They provide entrance to the Pioneer Museum, Vereins Kirche Museum and Historic Jail (when open for programs).

Guided tours give groups of 15 or more an elevated Pioneer Museum experience with guides that interpret the historical relevance of each structure and, provide information. Guided tours are about an hour and a half.

The Pioneer Museum store offers a varied selection of historical books by Texas Hill Country authors, locally made sauces, jams, candles and Texas-themed home decor, aprons, hand towels, pillows, signs, toys and memorabilia.

#### **ADMISSION - DAY PASS**

General Admission is \$12, Military and Senior \$7, Student \$5, Children age 5 and under are free.

### A LANDMARK AND SYMBOL

The Vereins Kirche (Society Church) is a unique landmark in the center of downtown Fredericksburg. The octagonal building is owned and managed by the Gillespie County Historical Society (GCHS).

The Vereins Kirche features the history of the building in a permanent exhibit that begins with German immigrants' trip to Texas in the 1840s.

In January 1934, GCHS was formed to rebuild the Vereins Kirche. Since then, it has continued to preserve the history and culture of Fredericksburg and Gillespie County through exhibits and educational programs, and outreach. The building last underwent extensive restoration in 2019.

#### **HISTORY**

The original Vereins Kirche served as the town's first church, school and public meeting place, in addition to being a lookout building for protection against invaders.

The replica of the Vereins Kirche has been used as a library, home to the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce, a one-day post office and a museum.

The original Vereins Kirche was used primarily as a church and school for Catholic and Evangelical Protestants. School districts were created in Gillespie County in the 1850s and students stopped using the Vereins Kirche. As with the schools, church congregations began building their own churches in town and slowly leaving the Vereins Kirche empty most days.

By the town's 50th anniversary in 1896, the stone walls were removed to make the Vereins Kirche a pavilion for the celebration. The building was torn down in 1897 after it fell into disrepair.

For many years, local citizens had the vision of building a replica of the Vereins Kirche.

In 1934, GCHS received its charter and began working to rebuild the Vereins Kirche as a pioneer memorial. Fundraising by citizens and help from the New Deal Public Works Administration supported the construction of the Vereins Kirche. A celebration was held in May 1935 and the Vereins Kirche Pioneer Memorial officially opened.

The first use of the new Vereins Kirche was to house Pioneer Memorial Library and a small historical museum. The first exhibits included memorabilia and collectibles from early pioneer days.

When the Gillespie County Historical Society purchased the Kammlah Homestead in 1955, most of its artifacts were moved and displayed in the Kammlah House. A small exhibit space remained in the Vereins Kirche.

In 1967, after the second courthouse had been refurbished by Eugene and Margaret McDermott of Dallas, Pioneer Memorial Library left the Vereins Kirche and took up residence in the McDermott Building, where it remains today.

For a few years, part of the Vereins Kirche was home to the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce, with GCHS exhibit space occupying some of the building. It was during this time that the GCHS began archiving and organizing its collection.

When the Chamber moved out of the Vereins Kirche, the space became an area for the GCHS Archives and Collections (now located at the GCHS offices in the historic First Methodist Church at 312 West San Antonio Street).

#### **Hours of Operation**

The Vereins Kirche is open six days a week, year-round, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., closed on Sundays.

There is an admission fee of \$5. Tickets can be purchased at the Vereins Kirche or at Pioneer Museum, 325 West Main Street.




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
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
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
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

## HISTORIC FORT MARTIN SCOTT **CELEBRATES 175 YEARS SINCE** ITS STORIED FOUNDING

ort Martin Scott, on the eastern edge of Fredericksburg on the old Pinta Trail, has a rich history of diverse groups of people that shaped Fredericksburg, Gillespie County and the Texas Hill Country.

This year the fort celebrates its 175th anniversary with special events honoring its heritage.

On the eastern edge of Fredericksburg and adjacent to the Texas Rangers Heritage Center, Fort Martin Scott was the first U.S. Army post on the Texas frontier. Apache and Comanche tribes, Spaniards, Anglo settlers, Latter-day Saints, Texas Rangers and the U.S. Army have all left their footprints at the fort.

With outbreaks of attacks between early settlers and Native Americans, in 1823, a group of frontiersmen was formed to act as "rangers" to protect the citizens, starting what became known as the Texas Rangers.

When Texas became a state in 1845. the Comanche remained north of a site that the Rangers are thought to have used as a camp, on the banks of Barons Creek and the Pinta Trail.

John O. Meusebach and German settlers established the town of Fredericksburg just west of this site in 1846. Latter-day Saints (Mormons) started a town called Zodiac east of Fredericksburg in 1847.

The Germans, Latter-day Saints,

Native Americans and Rangers established a cooperative society, supporting each other. The Latter-day Saints started the first lumber and grist mill and were instrumental in helping build the fort and town. The Germans signed a peace treaty with the Comanche in 1847 allowing trade with them for food and supplies.

U.S. Army units arrived in 1848, settling on the Barons Creek site, naming it Camp Houston. This became the first in a string of frontier forts established to help protect Anglos moving west. The camp was renamed Fort Martin Scott in December 1849 after Lt. Col. Martin Scott, who died in the Mexican-American War. Infantry units were followed by horse-mounted dragoons, who led scouting patrols and escorts for the settlers.

In 1850, Indian Agent John Rollins, Army, and Rangers representatives and interpreters met with a group of chiefs on the banks of the San Saba River and forged the Fort Martin Scott Treaty of 1850. Today, the Treaty Stone recognizing the pact is displayed in the fort visitor center.

By 1853, the frontier had moved

west and so had the Army. Fort Martin Scott became a supply depot and was permanently abandoned by the Army in 1866.

But the story of the fort doesn't end there. In 1870, John Braeutigam bought acreage that included the fort guardhouse, their home for 90 years. He created Braeutigam Gardens, which included a saloon, store, race track and the area's first dance hall. The first four Gillespie County fairs were held in the gardens. But the fairs and gardens ended with the robbery and murder of Braeutigam and his saloon in 1884.

The Braeutigam family farmed the land until 1959 when they sold it to the City of Fredericksburg.

The Fredericksburg Heritage Federation started restoration of the fort that continues today.

This year Fort Martin Scott celebrates its 175th year since its founding with a day full of commemorative events on March 8. A replica of an 1850s Army field hospital was set up on the grounds. The 323rd Army Band performed a concert under the stars. German choirs performed

music including both the U.S. and German National Anthems.

A memorial stone made by Llano Memorial Works was made for the event and was presented during a ceremony in which names were read of every known soldier to have died at the fort, followed by the playing of "Taps" by the Army Band.


Several guests spoke at the event including Fredericksburg Mayor Jeryl Hoover.

The fort is a park owned and operated by the City of Fredericksburg. Today, the site includes a visitor center/ barracks, restored officer's quarters, the guardhouse (the only original building), a blacksmith shop and stone foundations of many of the buildings.

Throughout the year, the fort comes alive with reenactments, storytelling, education days for schools and special

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


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






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
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### **ENCHANTED ROCK WOWS VISITORS AS A UNIQUE AND POPULAR ATTRACTION**

ven though the majestic pink granite dome brings visitors to the Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, it's the site's expansive views and native wildlife that keep visitors coming back.

The unique natural attraction towers 1,825 feet in elevation and attracts hundreds of thousands of hikers, campers and outdoor enthusiasts each

In addition to hiking, Enchanted Rock SNA offers opportunities to rock climb, boulder climb and stargaze.

It is one of the best places in the area to see the night sky and is one of only a few Texas Parks and Wildlife Department properties that are certified "Gold Tier" Dark Sky Parks.

This designation means that Enchanted Rock complies with the International Dark Sky Association requirements, which not only conserves energy for the natural area, but also guarantees visitors will have an undistracted view of the night sky. It helps the area cut down on light pollution, and promotes low-impact

ecotourism as one of the surrounding area's most sought destinations.

Along with protecting the natural area from light pollution, Enchanted Rock also asks visitors to protect the property from unintentional petinflicted damage.

In the natural area, pets are only allowed in the designated day-use picnic areas, the campgrounds and on the Loop Trail. Pets are not allowed on any other trails.





#### **MYTHS AND LEGENDS**

Enchanted Rock has fascinated humans for thousands of years. It has inspired many stories that endure today, most rooted in fancy rather than


Tonkawa Indians thought that ghost fires flickered on top of the dome. The rock glitters on clear nights after rain and scientists now think the glittering is reflections from collected water or wet feldspar.

Odd creaking and groaning noises scared the Tonkawa Indians, inspiring the rock's name. Geologists claim the dome creaks and groans as temperatures warm and cool.

#### THINGS TO KNOW

- The Rock sits at just 1,825 feet. Hikers can be challenged due to the steep incline of the climb to the
- The main campground has restroom facilities, but there are more remote sites scattered along the trails. Due to a critical water shortage, the restrooms may also be closed but portable toilets will be made available.
- Even though drinking water is available for purchase, visitors are highly encouraged to bring their own water and enough for the visit.
- · Trails, varying in length and difficulty, can be found in the natural area. The Loop Trail winds around the natural area a lengthy 4.5 miles, while the trek to the summit of the Rock is only a three-quarter mile climb, but strenuous.
- Enchanted Rock's peak season ranges from September through May,



#### BATS ATTRACT VISITORS AT OLD TUNNEL STATE PARK

A n old abandoned railroad tunnel is home to up to three million bats from May through October.

During those months, visitors can

During those months, visitors can watch the bats emerge from the tunnel nightly.

The tunnel, built in 1913, was used

by the Fredericksburg and Northern Railway until its abandonment in 1941.

Permits for entry into Old Tunnel State Park and fees for the bat viewing must be purchased online. No permits are sold onsite. Entry is limited.

The tunnel is located at 10619 Old

San Antonio Road, and is open from sunrise to 5 p.m. Hours are extended depending on the times the bats emerge in the summertime.

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## **CROSS MOUNTAIN** OFFERS HILL **COUNTRY VIEWS**

ross Mountain Park is getting a → new cross this year. The old cross (not the original) was installed in the 1940s and was in poor condition.

The City of Fredericksburg, in partnership with the Nimitz Rotary Club, is replacing the old cross and will install a new one this spring with similar characteristics.

Cross Mountain Park is home to Cross Mountain, a marl and limestone hill with an elevation of 1,951 feet.

The park offers several trails, three picnic areas, an overlook and restrooms.


The park is open from dawn until dusk and there is no fee to enter.

To the right, Cross Mountain offers an overlook of Fredericksburg and the surrounding area after a short hike up the mountain.





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
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Just three miles from downtown, the 150-acre Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park is the crown jewel of the City of Fredericksburg's parks system. It's a recreational getaway for locals and visitors, alike.

There is no admission charge to enter the park, southwest of town on Texas 16 South.

#### **DAY USE ACTIVITIES**

Daytime visitors to the park can use picnic tables (available on a firstcome first-served basis) and four playgrounds at no charge.

Three nature trails take hikers across Live Oak Creek and give nature lovers a chance to be up close and personal with the natural habitat.

The pathways were established by the

Friends of the Fredericksburg Nature Center.

A 17-acre lake offers plenty of spots to wet a line. Motorboats, however, are prohibited, as are trotlines and swimming.

Play a pickup game on the outdoor basketball courts or a volleyball match on the sand court. Baseball and softball fields can be reserved or used casually. Take a splash in the park's swimming pool during the hot summer months, or catch a tennis or pickle ball game at the courts nearby.

#### **RENTAL FACILITIES**

Visitors who plan large gatherings may want to look into using one of the park's five large outdoor covered pavilions or one of two indoor sites, including the Tatsch House or the spacious Pioneer Pavilion.

Each of the five outdoor pavilions is available on a first-come first-served basis or by reservation.

Information about the facilities and reservation opportunities is available from the City of Fredericksburg's website at fbgtx.org.

#### **OVERNIGHT CAMPING**

Camping under the stars is available at the park camp grounds, which accommodates both RVs and tents.

In all, there are 98 RV spaces available for travel trailers with 30-50 amp electrical hookups, water and sewer, cable TV, free wireless Internet and shade trees.

A fee schedule is listed on the city's







site.

All campers must check in at the park office to receive a camping permit.

There are nine comfort stations to serve visitors, and three bathhouses.

Pets are welcome but must be kept on a leash.

Fredericksburg Dog Park Association.

It is located at the front of the park, with prime views of takeoffs and landings at the Gillespie County Airport.

A separated small dog area is available for dogs 25 pounds or under. Trash bins and dog-waste bags are provided. The park asks everyone to use common courtesy and clean up after their pets.

All dogs must be up to date on vaccinations, as required by the City of Fredericksburg code of Ordinances.

ver 80,000 people visit the LBJ State Park and Historic Site annually for a glimpse of where Gillespie County native Lyndon B. Johnson, the 36th President of the United States spent his childhood.

Located two miles east of Stonewall, visitors to this day use park can enjoy historical sites, picnicking, fishing, swimming, nature trails and wildlife.

It's home to the Official Texas State Longhorn Herd and the grounds routinely offer sightings of buffalo, wild turkey and white-tailed deer.

The state park also houses the Visitor Center, which is a part of the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park.

Attached to the Visitor Center is the Behrens Cabin, a two-room dogtrot cabin built during the 1840s by German immigrant Johannes Behrens.

There's also an outdoor amphitheater used for a variety of programs.

Numerous shaded picnic and rest areas (some with restroom facilities) are available at the state park.

From early June throughout the summer, a large pool facility —

complete with children's wading pool and a covered pavilion — is manned by certified lifeguards.

Nearby are two lighted tennis courts. The park's dining hall and group picnic area, located on the banks of the Pedernales River, as well as a separate baseball diamond facility are available by reservation.

Fishing is allowed without a license from the banks of state park lands. However, those who go into the waterways, for example, on a boat, must have a fishing license.

## **BACK TO SCHOOL AT HISTORIC COUNTRY SCHOOLS**

hile diving into the history of Gillespie County and Fredericksburg, one stop history buffs must make is at one of the many Gillespie County country schools.

Gillespie County is home to 17 historic country schools, each with its own story to tell. Many of the schools were one-teacher schools, teaching up to 10 different age groups at one time.

A great way to view multiple schools is a historic 120-mile bicycle trail that covers all 17 schools, which span as far back as 1847. The trail is divided into four quadrants of varying ride lengths.

The historic buildings have features unique to the Hill Country, including limestone, framed wood and tin exteriors.

Many of these schools are now available as rental buildings for weddings, reunions, groups and



## MARKTPLATZ CENTERS TOWN'S PAST AND PRESENT

ocated in the center of downtown Fredericksburg, Marktplatz offers a place to take in a bit of local history as well as relax.

Marktplatz is also home to many festivals and events throughout the year.

The iconic Vereins Kirche, widely recognized as the symbol of Fredericksburg, stands in the center of the square and is a replica of the first house of worship, meeting place and fortress built soon after the city's founding in 1846.

Today, the building displays mementos and information on the city's history.

Marktplatz was originally known as Market Square until the area was redeveloped to its present state in time for the city's 150th anniversary in 1996.

The area was originally designated by the city's founder, John O. Meusebach, as a place for people to gather and enjoy themselves.

Today, the area is primarily a showplace, far from the days when it was home to filling stations, used car lots and a variety of other structures, including a youth baseball field.

The "Marktplatz Service Building" is located at the corner of Main and Adams streets and houses a substation for the Fredericksburg Police Department, where bicycle patrols and citizens' police volunteer organizations can operate out of.

Public restrooms are located on the Adams Street side of the building, with additional restroom facilities located in the adjacent building.

In 2023, construction began on another restroom facility at a building on the corner of Austin and North Crockett streets. The newly renovated structure also includes an indoor event space.

One of the most active areas of the square is a shaded playground, where parents can often be seen socializing while their children run, climb and slide.

Events are often held in one or more of the three covered pavilions - Adelsverein Halle, the Oktoberfest Halle and the Kinder Halle.

Also at Markpltatz are brick walkways, numerous arbors and a History Walk that honors the pioneers of the community, including President Lyndon B. Johnson, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz and the men and women who have served in the armed forces, along with Jacob Brodbeck, a pioneer resident of Fredericksburg who significantly impacted early aviation.

A statue of Fredericksburg-born composer Frank Valentin van der Stucken is located in the Pioneer Garden on the square.

Also in the Pioneer Garden near the water wheel is a near-life-size bronze statue of Meusebach's yet-unbroken peace treaty with the Comanche Indians. Dedicated in 1997, the memorial was placed by the city's 150th Anniversary committee.

Near the Adelsverein Halle is a Maibaum, or Maypole, erected in 1991 and designed by John W. Schulze, that tells the history of Fredericksburg's founding and early development through symbolic representations on each tier of the pole. It stylistically mirrors similar installations found in major town squares in Germany.

Brick walkways in the area include engraved bricks recognizing donors who have purchased them to help finance the redevelopment of the square and to perpetuate their names in the community.

At other places, there are benches, lamps and other fixtures.

A bust of the city's founder, John O. Meusebach, stands in front of the Vereins Kirche.


A historical marker, facing Main Street near one of the pathways to the Vereins Kirche, tells of the historical significance of Marktplatz and invites residents and visitors to make use of the historic square.



Mirroring similar ones found in major city squares throughout Germany, a Maibaum, or Maypole, stands in Marktplatz with arms symbolically telling the story of Fredericksburg's founding and development. The Maibaum was erected in 1991 and is one of several representations commemorating the town's history.

Marktplatz is commonly used for many of Fredericksburg's festivals and events and often serves as a meeting space for residents and visitors to share and enjoy.

## **TEXAS RANGERS HERITAGE CENTER HONORS STATE'S HISTORIC LAWMEN**

Reeping in line with Fredericksburg's dedication to historic preservation, the Texas Rangers Heritage Center brings the story of the state's famous lawmen to life.

The TRHC site includes a 12-acre campus that features a 350-seat openair pavilion with a full catering kitchen and a Lone Star Stories Campfire Ring. The amenities support a wide range of event opportunities.

Phase I of the Texas Rangers Heritage Center is complete. The project on the town's eastern edge was about 14 years in the planning.

In September 2013, then-Gov. Rick Perry and other dignitaries attended a groundbreaking ceremony on the land between Fort Martin Scott and the Hill Country University Center.

The site also includes a campanile (bell tower) and a Ring of Honor, and a 30-foot simulation of a Ranger badge, which memorializes Rangers who lost their lives in the line of duty.

The foundation has begun fundraising for Phase II, which will feature a museum building. There, visitors will learn about well-known Rangers and episodes in Ranger history and see a historic flintlock rifle used by Mexican Texas colonist and elder statesman Ben Milam during the Siege of Béxar. Construction is slated to start soon.

Museum planners promise an immersive experience which will include interactive exhibits, a theater, galleries associated with the character

traits of the Texas Rangers, and episodes of Rangers who battled bootlegging, counterfeiting and murder, and the man who stopped the University of Texas Tower shooter in 1966.

Youth will be taught the five Ranger traits of courage, determination, dedication, respect and integrity.

Meet the farmer, rancher, chef and artisan baker and support local agriculture and viticulture in Fredericksburg, the community way.



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

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# CYCLISTS TAKE BACK THE ROADS

cyclists drive long distances to ride long distances during Texas Hell Week. From March 24-April 1 cyclists will take to the backroads of Gillespie County during the annual gathering that culminates with two race events.

Texas Hell Week has been an early season tradition since 1991 for cyclists. The Texas Hill Country offers some of the best spring riding in America. From mid-March to mid-April, the wildflowers are in bloom, making for a memorable riding experience.

Three daily rides are offered throughout Texas Hell Week, a 30-50mile ride, a 50-80-mile ride and a 60-100-mile ride. Each ride is different. Participants can ride as much as they want.

The week will conclude with two races, the Stampede 200 and the Longhorn 500, which is a RAAM (Race Across America) Qualifier. RAAM is a coast-to-coast 3,000-mile bicycle race that begins in June in Oceanside, California and finishes in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Evenings also feature a series of instructional seminars on coaching, nutrition and crew.

#### **HISTORY**

The event originated when Nick Gerlich, an avid cyclist and associate professor at West Texas A&M Cyclists come to the area from across the nation to participate in Texas Hell Week, a multi-day event with daily rides and seminars. The annual gathering gives cyclists a chance to see the area's backroads during the spring wildflower bloom.

University convinced a few friends to meet in San Marcos for some early season warm weather riding, with hopes of getting into shape for the riding season.

They dubbed the informal gathering 'Texas Hell Week.' With increasing traffic in the Austin area, Gerlich moved the event to Fredericksburg in 1994. Texas Hell Week has seen steady growth and now attracts more than 300 riders from across the nation. Texas Hell Week took a two-year-hiatus after 2017 after which Fred and Rick Boethling acquired the event, combining Texas Hell Week with their Texas RAAM Challenge.





## A TOTAL **ECLIPSE AT OUR PARKS**

### **FREDERICKSBURG** AREA OFFERS PRIME **VIEWING FOR RARE CELESTIAL EVENT**

Following an annular solar eclipse in Gillespie County on Oct. 14, 2023 (pictured), Gillespie County will be a prime viewing spot for a rare total solar eclipse on April 8, 2024. The event is expected to bring thousands of visitors to the area for the once-in-a-lifetime view.

illespie County is a prime destination this spring for viewing of the Great North American Eclipse, a total solar eclipse on Monday, April 8. Fredericksburg will be in the path of totality, part of a narrow path where viewers will see total coverage of the sun.

Because of Fredericksburg's optimal location for this rare celestial event, the area will likely see a significant

number of visitors on April 8 and the surrounding days. Area officials expect an additional 100,000 visitors during the day of the eclipse.

#### THE ECLIPSE

The Great North American Eclipse is a total eclipse, an event when the moon passes between Earth and the sun. Because of the moon's proximity to Earth, the moon's diameter will

completely block the direct light of the sun, causing darkness in the middle of the day.

On April 8, the eclipse will take place from 12:15 p.m. to 2:56 p.m. with the total eclipse taking place from 1:32 p.m. to 1:37 p.m. The time of total coverage of the sun is approximately four minutes and 30 seconds.

For those wishing to view the eclipse, eye safety is extremely important

as viewing an eclipse can cause permanent eye damage. Viewers are encouraged to only use eclipse glasses with a rating of ISO 12312-2, a darkness thousands of times darker than regular sunglasses. Eclipse glasses are available at many locations throughout the county.

This is the first total eclipse to be seen in the United States since 2017; it won't happen again until August 23, 2044.

#### WHAT TO EXPECT

Many of Fredericksburg's accommodations are booked to near or full capacity for dates around the eclipse. Visitors should be prepared for limited availability of rooms and possible increased costs.

The area is also likely to experience increased traffic, with the highest congestion expected in the hours immediately following totality, as visitors drive back home.

Drivers should expect long delays and be prepared with fuel and personal resources.

The City of Fredericksburg and Gillespie County have worked together to establish an Eclipse Task Force that

is working to prepare the area for the increased demands from visitors.

Additional trash receptacles will be placed throughout the county. Mesh trash bags will be available for pickup at key locations, including the Fredericksburg Convention and Visitor Bureau. These trash bags may be used by visitors to self-manage personal trash from their viewing location.

Additional portable restrooms will also be placed at key locations throughout the county.

The City of Fredericksburg is providing official viewing locations at both Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park and the Marktplatz downtown square. Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park is located three miles south of downtown Fredericksburg off U.S. Highway 16 South.

Lyndon B. Johnson State Park and Historic Site, Lyndon B. Johnson National Historic Park and Enchanted Rock State Natural Area are also viewing locations, but may require reservations.

Many other businesses in the area are hosting private events for the eclipse, including many of the wineries in the county. Neither the city nor the county

is hosting any official celebration. Visitors can visit visitfredericksburgtx. com/eclipse/events for a list of events planned in the area.

The website also contains lists of accommodations, locations for the purchase of eclipse glasses, and answers to frequently asked questions.

On the day of the eclipse, especially in the hours near and during totality, local radio station KNAF 910 AM will provide information to listeners on traffic conditions and any special announcements.





All-access badges give access to a filmmaker welcome on Thursday night, panels, parties and then the Sunday send-off event at Pedernales Cellars.











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

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


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# **ANNUAL SWAP MEET DRAWS COLLECTORS AND CAR ENTHUSIASTS**



G illespie County is coming up on the 136th year of its historic fair, which is set for Thursday through Sunday, Aug. 22-25.

Sponsored by the Gillespie County Fair and Festivals Association, the 136th Gillespie County Fair will include two days of live pari-mutuel horse racing, a carnival and midway, displays of agricultural and home products, a parade, queen's contest, antique machinery displays, musical entertainment, livestock shows and more

With the exception of the parade, all activities take place at the Gillespie County Fair Grounds, located about 2 miles from downtown Fredericksburg, off Texas 16 South (Kerrville highway).

The fair opens on Thursday night, Aug. 22, with Tejano music and free admission to the grounds.

The carnival and midway will be operating, and judging will take place in the various agricultural and home products divisions.

The kickoff parade is on Friday, Aug. 23, at 10 a.m., on Fredericksburg's Main Street.

After the parade, activities shift back to the Gillespie County Fair Grounds, where three full days of events are planned, including dances on Friday and Saturday nights at the outdoor pavilion.

Entertainers and other plans are being finalized, and information will be announced in the regular issues of the Fredericksburg Standard-Radio Post.

Another highlight of the event is the crowning of the new Gillespie County Fair Queen and her court on Friday night, Aug. 23.

Pari-mutuel horse races will be run Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 24-25.


Post time for the races both days is 1 p.m.

#### History

Since its beginning before the turn of the century, the Gillespie County Fair

has been held at numerous locations, including the banks of Barons Creek, just east of the city on the site of Old Fort Martin Scott. Later, it was moved to where the Turner Hall was located on West Travis Street. (The Turner Hall was destroyed by a fire in June of 2016.)

From there, the fair was held on a knoll near the former location of the City of Fredericksburg Electrical Department, off of South Washington Street.

Years afterward, the fair was conducted at what people today call the old fair grounds, two blocks from Main Street on the Kerrville Highway.

The present facility, located off Texas 16 South, was dedicated in 1976 during the U.S. Bicentennial.

The current site includes a 5/8-mile racetrack, grandstand, biergarten, exhibition hall, livestock barn, food court, restroom facilities, an outdoor dance pavilion and ample parking.

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


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

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
